ABOUT WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Western Australia - it's big, beautiful and billions of years old.

Around the size of Western Europe, WA accounts for one-third of the Australian continent. It boasts over 12,500 kilometres of coastline (20,000 including islands), the world's oldest minerals and a host of natural wonders found nowhere else on Earth.

Of the State's population of 2.7 million people, around three-quarters live in the Perth region. With more than 3,000 hours of sunshine per year, Perth is Australia's sunniest capital city. The city's spectacular natural surroundings are rivalled only by its vibrant city life.

WA's Aboriginal history dates back more than 50,000 years – making it one of the world's oldest living cultures. Almost a third of Western Australians are born overseas and 15 per cent of the population speaks a language other than English at home.

Dreamlike experiences and natural wonders await you in every region of this grand and diverse State, and the varied climate – Mediterranean conditions in the south through to the northern tropics – means you'll always find summer somewhere in WA.





PERTH

Sitting pretty on the banks of the Swan River (Derbal Yerrigan) in Wadjuk Noongar country, Australia's sunniest capital city Perth effortlessly blends urban cool with raw natural beauty. Its heart is bustling with bars, restaurants, hotels, shopping and cultural spaces, and is also home to one of the world's most beautiful inner-city parks. Within 30 minutes of the city centre, visitors can be exploring Western Australia's oldest wine region, watching a famous Western Australian sunset, cycling around an island paradise or walking the streets of Fremantle (Walyalup).

Check out:

- Perth's sparkling CBD. An array of new public spaces and revitalised buildings have activated Perth CBD and surrounds. The vibrant waterfront precinct of Elizabeth Quay celebrates Perth's love affair with the Swan River with new hotels such as The Ritz-Carlton Perth and DoubleTree Hilton Perth Waterfront offering riverfront views, plus alfresco and rooftop dining options, public art and playgrounds. Connecting Perth CBD to Northbridge, Yagan Square connects people to place and is a celebration of Western Australia's Aboriginal heritage. Not to be missed is the spectacular new WA Museum Boola Bardip, located in the Perth Cultural Centre; and across the river, connected by the Matagarup Bridge, is the shiny new 60,000 seat world-class Optus Stadium.
- Natural attractions. Overlooking the Swan River and Perth city skyline, the stunning Kings Park and Botanic Garden (Kaarta Komba) is one of the largest inner-city parks in the world. At 400 hectares, it's bigger than Central Park in New York, it is home to more than 3,000 species of native plants and around 80 bird species. Tour its botanic gardens and spring wildflowers on a self or guided tour, or discover the park's rich culture with an Aboriginal guide. Within an hour of Perth's CBD you can swim with wild dolphins at Rockingham, cruise the canals in Mandurah, discover crystal caves in Yanchep National Park and hike the trails in the Perth Hills.

A stellar line-up of city beaches. Home to 19 pristine metropolitan beaches, it's easy to find your own piece of paradise to enjoy one of Western Australia's famous coastal sunsets - whether that be from the sand, a picnic area, or one of the coast's many dining options. From Bathers Beach in Fremantle and the iconic Cottesloe Beach, to the popular City Beach – just 20 minutes from the CBD, to the surf breaks of Scarborough Beach and beyond, Perth's dazzling stretch of endless sand crystal-clear blue waters, coastal walks, dune vegetation and sustainable development approach is unlike any capital city on Earth.

Wining and dining. Head into Perth's city centre and its urban hubs of Northbridge, Leederville, Lawley, Victoria Park and Subiaco, plus the port city of Fremantle for an ever-expanding range of small bars, restaurants, breweries and distilleries across the city's rooftops, laneways and heritage-listed buildings. Just a 30-minute drive from the CBD, or a cruise along the Swan River, will take you to Western Australia's oldest wine region, the Swan Valley. Tantalise your taste buds at over 40 world-class wineries, breweries, cideries, distilleries and gourmet artisan producers. Celebrate Perth's love affair with the coast by enjoying local seafood and sipping on a cool beverage whilst the sun sets over the Indian Ocean at one of the many coastal dining options.

An island playground. Famous for its laid-back atmosphere and home to 63 beautiful beaches and 20 bays, Rottnest Island (Wadjemup) is a unique island paradise located just a short ferry ride from the mainland. Explore the island by scenic flight, segway, skydive, hop on hop off bus, waterbike or kayak; grab a snorkel or join a tour to discover the abundance of spectacular marine life; and meet the world's friendliest animal, the quokka. The A Class Reserve is a carfree zone, and hiring a bicycle is the best way to get around.

An eclectic port city. Discover maritime history, a World Heritage-listed prison, café culture, lively bars and hundred-year-old markets in the port city of Fremantle (Walyalup) - located less than 30-minutes from Perth CBD. Known as 'Freo' to the locals, here you can explore narrow streets lined with historic buildings, enjoy fresh seafood at the Fremantle Fishing Boat Harbour, sample local brews at one of the micro-breweries and choose from a variety of funky cafes, boutique bars and top restaurants. Join a guided walking tour to discover the city's colourful convict and maritime history, bohemian culture and vibrant street art.







WA'S CORAL COAST

Home to awesome marine life, endless white sandy beaches and the warm, turquoise Indian Ocean, this region boasts two UNESCO World Heritage-listed sites; Ningaloo Marine Park and Shark Bay.



Check out:

Snorkelling at Ningaloo Reef. Where the outback meets the reef, step off the beach and swim a few metres to discover the underwater wonderland of the world's largest fringing reef, the traditional lands of the Baiyungu, Jiniqudira and Thalanyji people. Over 300-kilomtres long, the World Heritagelisted Ningaloo Reef is an absolute must do when visiting Exmouth, Coral Bay or the ocean-side pastoral stations north of Carnarvon. Dive into the pristine turquoise to discover more than 500 species of tropical fish and 220 species of colourful coral in one of the most biologically diverse marine environments on the planet.

[♀] SWIMMING WITH WHALE SHARKS, NINGALOO | NYINGGULU

- Swimming with gentle giants. Join a whale shark tour from Exmouth or Coral Bay for the ultimate bucket-list wildlife encounter swimming with the world's largest fish. Whale sharks visit Ningaloo Reef from mid-March to the end of July; and from July to October swim with another gentle giant, humpback whales. Year round you can also swim with acrobatic manta rays, while keeping an eye out for green and loggerhead turtles.
- Friendly dolphins and World Heritage-listed area. One of the world's most reliable places for witnessing wild dolphins, the curious bottlenose dolphins at Monkey Mia have been playing on the shores of Malgana country for over 40 years. While in the Shark Bay World Heritage Area, you can also spot sea turtles and dugongs, admire the world's oldest and largest living fossils - Hamelin Pool's stromatolites - and fish, snorkel and dive. Don't miss a trip into Francois Peron National Park, where striking red desert cliffs meet the turquoise sea.
- Wildflowers and pink waters. Head inland to explore some of Western Australia's most magnificent wildflower country, particularly between July and October when carpets of blooms paint the landscapes in a kaleidoscope of colour. While spotting some of WA's 12,000 wildflower species, check out other dreamy colours at Hutt Lagoon near Port Gregory, where waters could be red, bubble-gum pink or lilac depending on the conditions. The lagoon is located between other Coral Coast highlights - the seaside city of Geraldton (Jambinu) and its diving, snorkelling and fishing drawcard, the Houtman Abrolhos Islands National Park
- Extraordinary rock formations. Experience an otherworldly landscape of incredible limestone spires rising eerily from the sand at the Pinnacles in Nambung National Park. Further up the coast discover the town of Kalbarri (Wurdimarlu) in the Yamatii refion, surrounded by soaring coastal cliffs and the incredible river gorges in Kalbarrri National Park. Step out onto the 100-metre high, see-through Kalbarri Skywalk (Kaju Yatka) for breathtaking and uninterrupted views beyond the rim of the Murchison River Gorge. Follow the many walking trails and take a photo through the famous Nature's Window, hike along the dramatic red sandstone gorges or canoe along the Murchison River to experience the depths and heights of the 400 millionyear-old landscapes.







WA'S SOUTH WEST

Here you'll find world-class food and wine, beautiful beaches, surfing, cave systems, tall tree forests, whale-watching, wildflowers and the famous wine region of Margaret River on Wardandi Noongar country. As one of only 36 bio-diversity hotspots on Earth, the South West has thousands of plant species found nowhere else in the world.

Check out:

- World-class wine and fresh local produce. Home to six distinct wine regions including world-famous Margaret River, the South West also serves up some of Australia's best 'paddock to plate' fresh produce. Enjoy fresh marron, trout, venison, chocolates, cheeses, cherries, boutique beers and ciders as well as the rare black truffle – more of them are produced in Manjimup than anywhere else in Australia.
- Surfing, swimming, snorkelling. The South West is world famous for its spectacular coastline and magnificent surf and swimming beaches. At, you can follow in the footsteps of the world's best surfers who flock to the perfectly named Surfers Point for the annual Margaret River Pro. For more tranquil conditions, you'll find some of Australia's top swimming spots at Dunsborough, Eagle Bay, Denmark and Albany. Witness the wonders beneath the water through shipwreck diving, or you can stay dry at the eight metre deep Busselton Jetty Underwater Observatory.

Culture, arts and history. Learn more about the Aboriginal customs and history of the South West's first inhabitants through a number of Aboriginal centres and tours across the region. Forage for traditional bush foods, discover ancient traditions or experience the magic of a live didgeridoo performance inside an underground cave. You'll also find exceptional South West artistic talent including painters, sculptors, furniture makers, jewellery designers and handblown glass artists. Head to the coastal city of Albany (Kinjarling) and the multi award-winning National Anzac Centre for a deeply personal connection with Australia's ANZAC history.

Tall timbers. You'll get a bird's eye view of towering karri and tingle trees in the Valley of the Giants, between Denmark and Walpole, where the world-first Tree Top Walk is suspended 40 metres above the forest floor of Menang Noongar country. The South West is also home to giant jarrah, karri, marri and tuart trees. Near Pemberton you can climb two towering karri trees, up to 75 metres high, using climbing pegs to reach lookout towers.

Wildlife and Adventure. Get hiking along the spectacular coastal Cape to Cape Track, the bushland Bibbulmun Track, or out to the Porongurup Range's Granite Skywalk. Take off on two wheels along the Munda Biddi off-road cycling experience other world-class mountain biking trails through Collie and Margaret River or head underground at Ngilgi, Mammoth, Lake and Jewel caves to explore mesmerising labyrinths decorated with limestone crystal formations. From January to April, take an orca tour from Bremer Bay to see the southern hemisphere's largest killer whale pod in a deep-sea canyon 70 kilometres offshore. Between June and November, witness the annual migration of humpback, southern right and blue whales from the South West's shores, or hop on a whale-watching cruise and get up close to these gentle giants. Witness the surging power of the Southern Ocean at The Gap in Torndirrup National Park near Albany, and experience the views of one of Australia's most exposed coasts through the nearby Natural Bridge on Menang country.







WA'S GOLDEN OUTBACK

Discover historic townships, spectacular desert wilderness, quirky outback charm, gold-rush history and the Southern Ocean's perfect white beaches.

Check out:

White beaches and pink lakes. Home to Australia's whitest beach, Lucky Bay in Cape Le Grand National Park, just out of Esperance (Kepa Kurl), is so relaxing even the kangaroos sunbathe on the sand. For the full outdoor experience, follow the coastal walk trails or set up at some of Australia's most picturesque campsites. Back in town, be wowed around every corner along the 40-kilometre Great Ocean Drive. Catching the eye of photographers around the world is the bright pink Lake Hillier on Middle Island - where you'll witness astounding hues of bubblegum pink on a scenic flight by plane or helicopter.

- One of Australia's largest outdoor galleries. The striking salt flats of Lake Ballard form the backdrop of Inside Australia, a truly unique installation of 51 life-sized steel statues by acclaimed sculptor Antony Gormley, inspired by residents of the nearby town of Menzies on Wongutha country.
- Outback station stays. Immerse yourself in the rural life and landscapes of WA, escape the daily hustle and experience country living on a working station or farm. Accommodation ranges from luxury rooms in grand station homesteads to rustic shearing quarters and camping facilities on huge cattle stations. Visit during wildflower season – from July to October – when the rugged outback plains burst into a kaleidoscope of colour.
- Wildflowers and wave walking. You can try to surf it... Wave Rock (Katter Kich), near Hyden on Ballardong country, is a remarkable 110 metre, multi-coloured granite cliff that resembles a huge wave about to crash into the bush. There's also Hippo's Yawn (funnily enough, it resembles a hippo yawning), the Humps, and Mulka's Cave with its collection of Aboriginal rock art. In spring, you'll be surrounded by beautiful blankets of wildflowers in full bloom, with 60 per cent of the species unique to WA.
- The unexpected. Journey along the Golden Quest Discovery Trail from Perth to Coolgardie and Laverton on Wongutha country to discover aold-rush fascinating history. Highlights include legendary country pubs, the fascinating Gwalia ghost town and Kalgoorlie's famous Super Pit, one of the world's largest open-cut mines. Experience a touching tribute to man's best friend at the Corrigin Dog Cemetery, country quirkiness along the Tin Horse Highway - a collection of 70 equine artworks in and around Kulin, wheat silos adorned with giant, colourful murals, and the world's longest golf course: the 1,365-kilometre Nullarbor Links.

WA'S NORTH WEST

A billion years in the making, the North West is one of the world's last true wilderness areas. Here you'll find ancient gorges, thundering waterfalls, remote stretches of coastal paradise and rich culture and history.

Check out:

- Otherworldly wonders. Discover Australia's only horizontal waterfalls, created when massive tidal movements squeeze through narrow cliff passages. Talbot Bay in the Kimberley is home to Australia's only horizontal waterfalls, created when massive tidal movements squeeze water through narrow cliff passages. Aerial tours from Broome and Derby enable you to circle the phenomenon from above, alongside other scenic wonders of the Buccaneer Archipelago, where turquoise blue water contrasts with rugged red cliffs. Land nearby on a seaplane and experience the thrill of the falls up close by sipping through them on a speed boat, then stay overnight on a houseboat. Discover incredible natural wonders such as the worldfamous Cable Beach sunsets, dinosaur footprints, some of the biggest tides in the world and the natural phenomenon of the Staircase to the Moon; all whilst easing into something called 'Broome time.
- The pearling capital of Australia. A laidback tropical oasis, and where the outback meets the ocean, Broome's unique pearling history dates back to the late 1800s. Today Broome (Rubibi), the western gateway to the Kimberley, is one of the world's finest producers of pearls, and its unique history coupled with the culture of the Yawuru people offers a truly unique melting pot of Aboriginal and Asian heritage. Pearl farm tours offer a fascinating insight into the history and process of modern pearl farming, or visit the pearl showrooms in historic Chinatown and take home your own piece of pearl jewellery. Celebrate Broome's unique multicultural and pearling history at the annual Shinju Matsuri (festival of the pearl).

- Aboriginal experiences. The North West offers a range of profound Aboriginal experiences with the world's oldest living culture and the traditional custodians of this land. Explore ancient rock art galleries in remote places. Join an Aboriginal guide to go mud crabbing and spear fishing and listen to Dreamtime stories. North of Broome, the Dampier Peninsula on Yawuru country has the highest concentration of Aboriginal tourism offerings in Australia. On the Burrup Peninsula in Murujuga National Park, join an Aboriginal guide to witness the most prolific rock engraving (petroglyph) site in the world. The North West is also home to Australia's first 'Camping with Custodians' sites, offering selfdrive visitors the chance to interact with local communities while staying at campsites run by Aboriginal people on Aboriginal lands.
- Unforgettable outback adventures. Get off the beaten track at two of WA's most spectacular national parks. At Karijini National Park, in the Pilbara region, ancient rocks have been shaped into mountains and escarpments, awe-inspiring gorges and tree-lined watercourses. Stay in the heart of the park at Karijini Eco Retreat's luxury tents. The World Heritage-listed Purnululu National Park in the east of the Kimberley is home to one of the world's most striking geological features, the Bungle Bungle Range. The striped, beehive-like mounds are breath-taking from the air, or camp nearby to explore hidden gorges and pools.
- Remote luxury resorts and Kimberley cruising. Escape the well-known and well-trodden, and truly get away from it all at one of the North West's remote luxury resorts. The Berkeley River Lodge can only be reached by sea or air, Kimberley Coastal Camp is accessible only by helicopter, El Questro Homestead is cantilevered atop Chamberlain Gorge, and – true to its name – Faraway Bay is so remote you won't even find it on a map. For the ultimate wilderness adventure. experience the luxury of a Kimberley expedition cruise and discover the wild untamed beauty of the Kimberley coast. Cruise by sheer rugged cliffs, meander through secluded gorges, get up close to cascading waterfalls - then retreat back to the comfort of your own private suite.
- The hub of the eastern Kimberley. Kununurra (Goonoonoorrang) Miriwoong country is the perfect backdrop for an outback adventure and the gateway town to exploring the eastern region of the Kimberley. Base yourself here and join one of the many tours to experience the region's awe-inspiring attractions including the Bungle Bungle Range in Purnululu National Park, Mitchell Falls (Punamiiunpuu), El Questro and the mighty Lake Argyle. Start your epic Gibb River Road journey here, or venture around the town to discover vast, stunning landscapes, remarkable waterways and waterfalls, lush farmland, Aboriginal art galleries and Western Australia's oldest operating still.











Visitors can experience WA's natural beauty, state-of-the-art venues and diverse culture in unique and unforgettable ways through an incredible range of world-class cultural, arts, sporting and culinary events.



KEY EVENTS

SHINJU MATSURI

Culture, food – Broome, WA's Kimberley – August 20 to September 4, 2022

Japanese for 'festival of the pearl', Broome's annual Shinju Matsuri is a vibrant celebration of the town's unique multicultural and pearling history. Since the late 1800s, Broome's prized South Sea pearls have brought together local Aboriginal people with Japanese, Chinese, Malay, Koepanger, Filipino and European workers. This cultural fusion continues to flourish in present-day Broome, where Shinju Matsuri's nine-day whirlwind of colour, sound, taste and smell showcase the region's natural beauty and unique history.


ICC T20 MEN'S CRICKET WORLD CUP

Sport – Perth - October 16 to November 13, 2022

THOMAS DAMBO'S SCULPTURES IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Art, culture – Mandurah and Peel Region - November 12, 2022 to TBC

In an Australian-first, a series of enormous wooden sculptures will be installed south of Perth this year. Created by renowned Danish artist Thomas Dambo. standing at around five metres tall, the sculptures are intended to be protectors of the environment, and will each have their own distinct personality. Visitors will be encouraged to explore and discover these installations at five secret locations in Mandurah and the wider Peel region. An artist of international acclaim, Dambo has exhibited extensively throughout the world. His practice celebrates the diversity, beauty and importance of the natural world, with his works all handmade using recycled materials



PERTH FESTIVAL

Culture – Perth – February 10 to March 5, 2023

Perth Festival is Australia's longest-running and most diverse international arts festival. It is renowned as a showcase for Aboriginal culture, presenting major new international premieres and celebrating Perth's unique qualities and stories for diverse audiences. Over three weeks, the best artists of Western Australia and the world come together for hundreds of exciting shows across theatre, music, dance, film, literature, visual arts and free community events. Its many outdoor venues make the most of Perth's natural beauty and consistent late-summer climate.

The WA tourism industry built this new brand. The journey to Walking On A Dream has been many years in the making. More than two years ago, Tourism WA began working on a new tourism brand for Western Australia that would set our unique State apart from competitor destinations across the country, and around the world. After undertaking the most extensive consultation in the Agency's history - which included consultation with more than 500 tourism industry business owners and leaders from across all regions of the State, and testing with more than 110 local, national and international consumers - the Our Story: The Spirit of Adventure narrative was born.

Our Story: The Spirit of Adventure is a narrative framework that outlines what makes Western Australia so special. It does this through five key pillars designed to provoke the spirit of adventure in every traveller, with these pillars the foundation for all Tourism WA's subsequent marketing and creative activities, including the domestic Wander Out Yonder campaigns and the Adventure Awaits international platform.

These five story pillars outline what Western Australia is, at its core. Western Australia is: Ancient Tracks, New Journeys™; barefoot luxury; otherworldly phenomena; majestic landscapes and big skies; and full of characters.

Walking On A Dream is inspired by the Our Story: The Spirit of Adventure narrative. Walking On A Dream uses the same founding principles to underpin a new creative approach for a bold new brand, to make WA shine as a world-leading destination of choice in a competitive global marketplace.

While the Our Story pillars still represent what makes WA unique and differentiates us from other destinations, we have added the themes of Time, Space, Connection and Freedom into our narrative.

FREEDOM

Western Australia is brimming with special and rare experiences, for those seeking the freedom to embark on new adventures. Luxury, but not as you know it. One-of-akind experiences, set on nature's doorstep. Relaxed and down to earth. The freedom to embark on every kind of unforgettable adventure.

These pillars and the Walking On A Dream creative concept will give Tourism WA's marketing and communications the uniqueness needed to make Western Australia shine as an aspirational, memorable and desirable destination for leisure and business travel, from now and into the future.





PERTH HOTEL DEVELOPMENTS

Perth (Boorloo) continues to offer a number of new and refurbished properties that have opened in the CBD and surrounding urban and regional areas.

In August 2022, the new 431-room Novotel Perth Murray Street officially opened to the public. The 431-room hotel is the largest Accor hotel in Perth, ideally located in the heart of the CBD. The property features a spectacular 12th floor fitness and spa facility, including a pool, steam room, day spa and sauna; four bars a café and restaurant; four meeting rooms and a conference room for up to 120 people; and spacious modern rooms

Perth's Parmelia Hilton hotel, which reopened in February 2021 after an extensive \$45 million-dollar refurbishment, welcomed the opening of two new luxury premier suites in October. Located on the tenth floor, the 80 square metre rooms feature a spacious bedroom, living and dining area, plus a stunning large bathtub. There is also balcony access with views, as well as Executive Lounge access. The new suites add to the already 32 new rooms and refurbished executive lounge, lobby and restaurant at the iconic 53-year old hotel.

IHG Hotels & Resorts opened the Holiday Inn West Perth in November 2021, located within walking distance to Perth's Kings Park and Botanical Gardens. Formerly the Sage Hotel West Perth, originally developed in 2016, the hotel's 101 guestrooms have all received a soft refurbishment, and the hotel lobby has been transformed.

Part of the hotel's charm is the 1902 heritage building that sits at the front of the property - home to Julio's, one of Perth's favourite Italian restaurants.

Since 2020, Perth has also welcomed the opening of DoubleTree by Hilton Perth Waterfront overlooking the Swan River and city skyline at Elizabeth Quay; Vibe Hotel in the inner-city suburb of Subiaco; Samphire Rottnest, the island's first boutique luxury accommodation offering; and the boutique, heritage-listed Warders Hotel in Fremantle.





PERTH'S NEW TOURS & ATTRACTIONS

The highly anticipated Matagarup Bridge zip-line is now zipping into action, having officially opened to the public on December 5, 2021. Similar to the Matagarup Bridge climb experience, which opened in January 2021, the zip-line adventure takes around 90 minutes, with guests having to climb 150 steps up the bridge to the launch platform, sitting over 35 metres above Perth's iconic Swan River. Zippers will reach speeds of up to 75 kilometres an hour in an exhilarating ride over the river, before landing on Burswood Park foreshore. The zip-line has been constructed with dual cable lines catering for two riders at a time, whilst also allowing riders as young as eight who are over 30 kilograms to participate with an adult quardian. Evening zip-line rides are also available, providing guests with a unique experience of Perth city at night.

A new 42-metre-high viewing platform opened at Perth's world-class Optus Stadium in 2022. Visitors and tour groups can walk along the new platform, which projects around five metres beyond the edge of the stadium roof, offering spectacular 360-degree views over the stadium and Perth city. The new VERTIGO tour allows the more daring participants to lean out from the rail less platform towards the playing field. The platform is accessible to all ages and abilities, with lift access available for those that require it. The new Optus Stadium visitor experience adds to the already successful HALO rooftop tours, and the other experiences available through The Ozone - including behind-the-scenes tours and Warrang Bridil's Aboriginal Cultural Tours.



CELEBRATING WA CULTURE & HERITAGE

Perth's vibrant cultural centre welcomed the opening of the spectacular new WA Museum Boola Bardip in November 2020. Acting as a gateway to explore all of WA, and a place to share the State's many stories - including the stories and perspectives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The museum hosts eight permanent exhibitions bursting with objects from the State's scientific and cultural collections, using state-of-the-art technology to truly immersive experiences, as well as a number of world-class exhibitions and special events throughout the year. New in 2022, visitors to the museum will enjoy free performances by Aboriginal Noongar dancers every Saturday morning as part of Nyumbi. Meaning 'celebration dance' in Noongar language, Nyumbi will offer a unique opportunity to experience WA's Noongar culture as Aboriginal dancers perform traditional song and dance, and share stories of the State's rich culture and history.

Overlooking the museum, the Art Gallery of WA's new rooftop venue opened to the public in November 2021. Elevate offers a new multi-use gallery space and rooftop venue that brings together art and entertainment against Perth's city skyline. The major redevelopment project has created the largest commercially available rooftop venue in Perth, accommodating up to 500 people. The new rooftop features food and beverages with a distinct WA flavour; an open-air sculpture walk, with works from the State Art Collection; a new internal gallery space for exhibitions and events; and two outdoor multi-purpose spaces with stunning views of the city, Perth Hills and WA Museum. The centrepiece of the rooftop is a new 34-metre digital Aboriginal art piece by Nyoongar/Minang artist Christopher Pease, which will wrap around one-third of the rooftop wall. The new venue also includes an external lift and sky bridge from the Perth Cultural Centre precinct - allowing visitors access to the rooftop when the gallery is closed.



PERTH'S NEW FOOD & DRINK OFFERINGS

Perth's hospitality scene continues to thrive, with a number of new venues that have recently opened, or are set to open in 2022.

In the heart of the CBD, Terrarium is an exciting new multi-level cocktail and spirits bar serving up specialist cocktails, a comprehensive selection of spirits, and a refined bar food menu. The stylish yet moody space is overflowing with greenery and timber tones, all centred around the huge terrarium it's named after.

In October 2021, Perth CBD's largest brewpub opened its doors. Pirate Life Perth is a new multi-venue site and the first WA venue for the South Australian brewery - setting up in the home city of the founding brewers, lack and Red. Located on Murray Street, the multi-storey space includes casual fine dining restaurant TOMA, basement rum bar Honey, two exclusive private dining rooms, as well as the in-house brewery with 16 Pirate Life Perth taps in the brewery's 15-metre main bar. Long Neck Brewery is another venue that's joined Perth's urban craft brewery scene. Located right on the iconic Swan River at Point Fraser, it offers direct boating access and welcomes a steady flow of recreational boats that can pull right up to the jetty to enjoy a brew with riverfront views.

Renowned chef and restauranteur Will Meyrick opened his latest restaurant in Perth. Will St is located in the city-fringing suburb of Leederville. The 120-person bar and restaurant is a culmination of Meyrick's culinary journey so far, having lived in Asia for almost 20 years and responsible for a number of hit restaurants in Bali including Hujan Locale, Mama San and Sarong. The menu includes a curated collection of traditional Asian share dishes alongside fun bar snacks, with the drinks list featuring classic western cocktails with spicy eastern notes and quality wines from around the globe.

Nearby, the iconic Leederville Hotel has recently transformed into the Leederville Precinct – home to the refurbished Leederville Hotel and outdoor venue The Garden, new bar and restaurant Servo, a dedicated beer bar Sandgropers, plus live music and entertainment venue Leeder Hall and late night bar and disco Daisy's.

Taking over the upstairs restaurant space at the iconic Indiana Tearooms at Cottesloe Beach, Indigo Oscar opened in December 2021, serving stunning cocktails and a Latin American inspired menu with panoramic views over the Indian Ocean. The opening of the pop-up restaurant coincided with the unveiling of the proposed future plans for the redevelopment of the much-loved Indiana Tearooms, which includes a new multi-level terrace design with new restaurant, cafe, kiosk, promenade and covered public plaza - as well as a new 31-room boutique hotel and day spa.

Two of WA's biggest spirit brands now call the Swan Valley wine region home, with the new Limeburners & Giniversity in the Valley opening its doors in June 2022. Master Distiller Cameron Syme brings his awardwinning whisky and gin experiences to the new venue, along with a contemporary dining offering. The new 200-seat venue includes a restaurant, bar, cellar door and function venue; with local beers and wines complementing the spirit offering - and also hosts the popular Giniversity and Limeburners blending experiences.

Also in the Swan Valley is the newly renovated brewery and restaurant Valley Social. The venue features a spacious interior with multiple zones - including a main bar spirit lounge and outdoor lawn area to enjoy local craft beers, ciders, spirits and wines served across three different bars. It is home to the largest glass micro-brewery kettle in the Southern Hemisphere, with all beers produced on-site, as well as the house spirits, as well a custom-built black beauty smoker serving up a variety of smoked barbeque meats.



FREMANTLE'S CONTINUING RENAISSANCE

Fremantle (Walyalup) has been named in TIME's annual list of the World's Greatest Places of 2022, which highlights 50 extraordinary travel destinations from around the globe. The port city, located just a half hour drive or train ride from Perth CBD, earned a spot in this year's list thanks to a once-in-a-generation renaissance of its civic heart and surrounds. The bohemian city blends old with the new, home to a 19th century port streetscape, and a recent surge of new hospitality offerings and public spaces. In the recently redeveloped city centre - Walyalup Koort (meaning 'Heart of Fremantle' in Whadjuk Noongar language) -FOMO is a new commercial space offering hawker-style food stalls, entertainment, art and dining spaces for visitors to enjoy.

Fremantle's civic heart has received a oncein-a-generation redevelopment, creating a vibrant cultural and commercial hub for Perth's port city. Walyalup Koort - which means 'Heart of Fremantle' in Whadjuk Noongar language, has welcomed the opening of the new Walyalup Civic Centre, including the stunning new Fremantle Library.

The redevelopment has seen rejuvenation of the precinct's public spaces, including the new Fremantle-themed adventure playground.

At the heart of the new hub is FOMO - a new commercial space offers a contemporary laneway retail, art and dining destination, providing visitors with a space to sit, eat, walk and engage.

The historic A Shed building at Fremantle's Victoria Quay is now home to a new brewery, with leading Perth craft brewer Gage Roads Brewing opening its first public-facing venue. The 1,500 capacity family-friendly venue includes a microbrewery, restaurant and bar, a children's play area, and 100-metres of al fresco seating overlooking the strip of ocean between Fremantle and Rottnest Island from which Gage Roads took its name. The brewery is part of Fremantle's Victoria Quay revitalisation project – which looks to enhance the public space at the historic port and develop the precinct into a major tourism and recreation space. It's also home to the world-class WA Maritime Museum


The Fremantle Courthouse has been given a new lease on life, re-opening as the Old Courthouse in December 2021. Originally built in 1899 and operating as a courthouse and police station up until 2001, the 122year old building has been transformed into a sleek bar and casual eatery.

The historic court rooms now serve up local brews, wines and a range of premium spirits, with reference to the building's history highlighted throughout. The bar leads out to an enclosed pavilion, a leafy outdoor beer garden and large grassed area.

Fremantle also continues to welcome new small bars and eateries. Jetty Bar & Eats is a new waterfront venue overlooking the Swan River.

Located right on the Jetty, the bar and eatery is designed to look like a low-key shack on the water, with the food menu delivering a fusion of Mediterranean cuisine. Located in a beautifully restored 150-year-old cottage, Nieuw Ruin offers 'good food, good cocktails and weird wine.' With a 300-bottle wine list, the all-woman team in the kitchen serve up fresh and local produce ranging from small snacks to generous dinners. There's also been a surge of new breweries and distilleries in recent years such as Running with Thieves, Calamity's Rod and Republic of Fremantle.





ROTTNEST ISLAND

Visitors Perth's Rottnest Island (Wadjemup) will now be welcomed by a spectacular new nine-metre-high sculpture, which opened to the public in December Called Koora-Yeye-Boordawan-2021. Kalvakoorl (Past-Present-Future-Forever), the sculpture depicts a Noongar warrior and breaching whale and creates a powerful statement at the end of the main ferry jetty where visitors arrive. It puts the finishing touch to a range of improvements and upgrades to embrace the Island's cultural heritage and ensure the longterm sustainability of WA's beloved tourist destination

Visitors to Rottnest Island can now also discover the island's underwater wonders on a new snorkelling tour experience. Rottnest Snorkel tours operate a threehour snorkelling experience led by highly experienced guides. Guests will step onboard a custom-built 10 metre boat to cruise the island's shallow bays and crystal clear waters. Snorkelers will have the opportunity to discover more the 400 species of fish, 20 types of coral and multiple shipwrecks. For those who wish to explore at their own pace, there is a new self-guided snorkel trail in the vibrant waters of Little Salmon Bay. Starting at the limestone reef along the left side of the bay, quests can use the yellow buoys as a guide, reading the information cards attached below the surface as they snorkel at their own pace.

A touch of Italy has recently arrived at the island, with new restaurant Isola – meaning 'island' in Italian – opening its doors.

Taking over the former Thomson Restaurant, guests can enjoy apertivos and share plates from an Italian inspired menu whilst overlooking stunning Thompsons Bay.

At Discovery Park Rottnest Island – the island's glamping accommodation that opened in 2018 – a million dollar investment has seen the upgrade of accommodation options for groups or larger families looking to stay together, and the refurbishment of popular Pinky's Beach Club, which includes a newly developed alfresco lawn space, increased weather protection and a resort style dining area.

SeaLink Rottnest has recently welcomed a new vessel to its fleet. Quokka 3; and Rottnest Fast Ferries has also launched its third and largest vessel, the Harbour Master. The additional vessel will allow for additional capacity and an expanded schedule for guests travelling to the island.

exciting news for Perth's island playground, a major redevelopment of Rottnest Island Lodge site has recently begun. The \$40 million development includes a range of new accommodation, affordable includina and premium options consisting of 46 new boutiquestyle rooms and 56 refurbished rooms. The redevelopment will also feature new food and beverage facilities - including a restaurant with a focus on WA produce, café, gelato bar, a wellness centre, community space and two pools. The redevelopment of the Rottnest Island Lodge is anticipated to be completed in 2025.

ABORIGINAL CULTURE & TOURISM

The rich and unique culture of Australia's Aboriginal people stretches back at least 50,000 years, making it the world's oldest living culture. Across coastal, urban and outback WA, more than 100 Aboriginal tourism operators proudly share their fascinating stories, distinctive cultures and traditional lands with visitors through a variety of authentic experiences, and the State continues to welcome a rise in the number of Aboriginal tourism operators wanting to share their culture.

In 2021, the Jina: Western Australian Aboriginal Tourism Action Plan was launched, with the vision of positioning WA as the premier authentic Aboriginal tourism destination in Australia. The four-year plan, backed by the \$20 million Aboriginal Tourism Fund, will support a range of initiatives including the development of new Aboriginal tourism experiences and encouraging more Aboriginal people to work in the tourism industry.

On Broome's Dampier Peninsular, join Roseanna Angus from Oolin Sunday Island Cultural Tours – a Jawi woman whose family lived on Sunday Island during the early mission days – to discover Bardi Jawi culture. Departing from Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm, the tours retrace the ocean journey from Bardi Country on the mainland through the network of islands and tidal passages that make up Jawi Country, and through the whirlpools and eddies between Jooloom and Jayirru to learn how these massive tidal currents were used by the Jawi people to hunt, fish and trade.


In May 2022, the sixth Camping with Custodians campground opened at Djarindjin on the Dampier Peninsula. Owned and operated by the Djarindjin Community, the 37-site campground is accessible directly off the newly sealed Cape Leveque Road, and will accommodate caravans as well as campers. Aboriginal tours and experiences will also be available to book through the new campground facility. The Camping with Custodians initiative is an Australian-first program that gives visitors the chance to stay at high quality campgrounds on Aboriginal lands that are operated by the community.

Murujuga National Park, located near the town of Karratha in WA's North West, is home to one of the largest, densest and most diverse collections of rock art (petroglyphs) in the world. There are over one million recorded, with some estimated to be more than 45,000 years old.

Given the region's incredible cultural significance to Aboriginal culture and history, work is well underway to have Murujuga National Park added to the World Heritage list.

The park was officially added to Australia's World Heritage Tentative List in February 2021, which is the first important step in the UNESCO World Heritage nomination process. With current timeframes, it is hoped that the earliest Murujuga will be added to the World Heritage list is 2024. To experience this incredible ancient art gallery through the eyes of a traditional owner, join Ngurrangga Tours on a guided tour to discover the cultural significance and history of the region.

In the Kimberley region, Home Valley Station has undergone new management. Run by Balanggarra Ventures, a subsidiary of traditional custodian group Balanggarra Aboriginal Corporation, the tourism facility is now known as Balanggarra Home Valley, and is taking bookings for 2023 (currently closed for the 2022 season).



On the country of the Balanggarra and the Wanjina-Wunggurr Wilinggin people, the expansive property offers 36 rooms, campgrounds, a swimming pool, a general store and the Dusty Bar and Grill. Balanggarra Home Valley will offer cultural tours with Traditional Owners, including stargazing and rock art tours and other activities.

Baiyungu Dreaming is the first Aboriginal tour experience on offer in the Ningaloo region, traditional owners of the Baiyungu, Yinigurdira and Thalanyji people. Join Baiyungu woman Hazel Walgar on a 4WD tagalong tour from the Aboriginal-run Carbadia Station in Coral Bay to explore hidden locations along the Ningaloo coast, discover culturally significant places and hear the stories connected to them. Explore the coastal plains near Coral Bay to discover shell middens and a sea turtle nursery, learn how to find fresh drinking water, or listen to Dreamtime stories by a sunset campfire.

In Broome (Rubibi), Mabu Buru Tours has launched the town's first and only Aboriginal corroboree experience on Yawuru Country. Wakaj - meaning 'the coming together of family' – is a unique Aboriginal experience provided in collaboration with Yatangal. The tour begins with a welcome from tour guide Iohani Mamid, who will then introduce Mervyn Mulardy to lead the Pintirri Dancers into a corroboree performance, traditionally known as Maru. The Pintirri Dancers will take quests into the sunset with the sounds of traditional Karajarri songs. Wakaj is a typical gathering of Johani and Mervyn's family, and the experience will leave guests with a deeper understanding of Yawuru and Karajarri culture, country and history.

SOUTH WEST DEVELOPMENTS

Australia's first Hilton Garden Inn opened its doors in November 2021, bringing a new level of accommodation to the coastal city of Albany in WA's Great Southern region. The Hilton Garden Inn Albany offers stunning views over the Albany Waterfront Marina, and is conveniently located next to the Albany Entertainment Centre, and walking distance to the city centre. The five-story hotel comprises 108 stylish and functional king, twin and accessible quest rooms, including six deluxe rooms each with panoramic ocean views; a 24-hour fitness centre; three meeting rooms; plus a variety of dining options including a restaurant, bar and 24-hour shop serving grab-and-go menu options.

In the Margaret River Region, Hotel Garden Inn Busselton is currently under construction along Busselton's popular foreshore precinct. The 112-room hotel is expected to open in 2023.

Construction on a new landmark hotel at the iconic Middleton Beach in Albany is due to start in 2022. A buyer has been confirmed for the ocean-front site, with Seashells Hospitality Group confirmed as the operator. The new four-star plus hotel – Seashells Albany – will offer 80 to 100 rooms with a choice of one and two-bedroom spacious and stylish suites. The hotel will also see the creation of beachfront food and beverage facilities.

Albany has also recently welcomed the opening of a new luxury accommodation offering.

Latitude 35°5 is an architecturally designed luxury holiday home located in Goode Beach surrounded by nature and sitting on top of a granite outcrop offering stunning panoramic views over the coastline

Accommodating up to eight people, the property features an expansive master suite and three guest rooms all with ensuites, large entertaining areas with dining room, cosy fireplace and a wraparound balcony also offering both sunrise and sunset views over the Southern Ocean

In the Margaret River Region, luxury hotel chain Marriott International will open a five-star resort in 2024. The Westin Margaret River Resort & Spa will be located on the southern headland of Gnarabup Beach – offering pristine views over the Indian Ocean, and will include 120 guest rooms, onsite dining venues, and meeting and event spaces.

In November 2021 Origins Market opened its doors in Busselton, offering a market like no other and a vibrant community hub for both locals and visitors the Margaret River Region. The market offers a space for more than 60 makers, growers, producers and artisans in the region to showcase their produce and talent, allowing visitors to engage with the farmers, producers, winemakers, artisans and creators – all under one roof. In 2022 the markets added a range of new bookable tours and experiences to its offering, ranging from food and wine pairings to art tours – providing a unique way for visitors to explore the culinary delights of the region.

South West Cruises launched an exciting new sunset dining concept for the Margaret River Region in January 2022. The half-day Taste of the Bays Cruise is an indulgent foodie experience featuring an all-inclusive, sevencourse progressive dinner on-board a 60-foot charter boat cruising through the calm waters of Dunsborough's Geographe Bay.



In 2022 KAS Helicopters started offering scenic flights thanks to the launch of its new seasonal base at Busselton Margaret River Airport. The seasonal tours provide a whole new perspective of the Margaret River Region, with scenic flights and winery tours on offer. Guests can choose from a short scenic flight over Busselton and surrounds, a full Cape to Cape tour, or a range of winery tours combining wine tastings and lunch, with bespoke itineraries also available.

New accommodation offerings in the Margaret River Region include Tree Chalets in Busselton (Undalup), nestled amongst 90 acres of bushland in chalets that are powered by the sun and fed by rainwater. The two chalets are fully self-contained and include a kitchenette, a separate bedroom with luxury bedding, walk-in rainfall shower, a wood fire, an outdoor cast iron bath with hot water and outdoor deck that offers stunning views over the Rosegum plantation, along with Tesla car charging stations.

Bina Maya Yallingup Escape – a self-catering luxury accommodation offering surrounded by bushland in Yallingup - has recently welcomed the addition of a new luxury villa. Luxury Villa Two complements the existing Luxury Villa One and The Residence – with signature Scandinavian features, two king bedrooms with ensuite bathrooms, an outdoor bath and shower, a fully equipped kitchen and stocked pantry, plus a lounge room with a log fireplace.

In the Southern Forests and Valleys town of Pemberton, Ampersand Estates has recently opened its cellar door and luxury accommodation offering. Located on the picturesque Donnelly River, the winery is a reimagining of the original Donnelly River Wines, one of the first wineries established in the region.

Working in partnership with some of the South West region's top wine makers, core wine varietals include Sauvignon Blanc, Shiraz, Tempranillo, Riesling and Pinot Noir. Ampersand Estates is also home to Rainfall Distillery – Australia's only single harvest distillery – producing vodka and gin using the finest local ingredients. In early 2022, the estate welcomed the opening of three fully self-contained luxury accommodation offerings - Settlers Cottage, The Homestead and The Vintners Residence.

Nearby in the town of Bridgetown, Serenity Gully is a new luxury off-grid eco glamping experience nestled high in the hills. Opening in September 2022, the property features three beautifully-appointed tents situated on 478 acres of private Jarrah forests and fields filled with wildflowers, native birds and animals. Each tent is fitted with a king-sized bed, ensuite, kitchenette, lounge room, private fire pit with gas barbeque, plus a cosy indoor fireplace and outdoor bath.

Further east in the Great Southern region, the town of Denmark has welcomed the opening of a new hospitality venue. The Raintree is a picturesque farming property, home to The Dam restaurant and a Cannabis Botanical Distillery – the first distillery in WA to use cannabis sativa to make its spirit base. The restaurant offers stunning views over the property's green hills, large dam and amphitheatre, and serves up a seasonal menu featuring local produce sourced straight from the property, alongside seltzers and cocktails made from the in-house distillery, plus local beers and wine.

Stillwood Retreat is а new bespoke accommodation offering for Denmark. Nestled amongst towering karri trees and set on five acres, the architecturally designed studio retreat is the perfect place to disconnect and immerse in nature. The sustainably focussed accommodation includes a living room with a fireplace, compact kitchenette, king bed and a twoperson bath tub with rain shower. Outside there are two jetties overlooking private dams, and an outdoor claw foot bath offering stunning views of the rolling hills and forest surrounds.

New accommodation offerings in the Margaret River Region include Tree Chalets in Busselton (Undalup), nestled amongst 90 acres of bushland in chalets that are powered by the sun and fed by rainwater.

The two chalets are fully self-contained and include a kitchenette, a separate bedroom with luxury bedding, walk-in rainfall shower, a wood fire, an outdoor cast iron bath with hot water and outdoor deck that offers stunning views over the Rosegum plantation, along with Tesla car charging stations.

Bina Maya Yallingup Escape – a self-catering luxury accommodation offering surrounded by bushland in Yallingup - has recently welcomed the addition of a new luxury villa. Luxury Villa Two complements the existing Luxury Villa One and The Residence – with signature Scandinavian features, two king bedrooms with ensuite bathrooms, an outdoor bath and shower, a fully equipped kitchen and stocked pantry, plus a lounge room with a log fireplace.



MARGARET RIVER REGION'S EPICUREAN OFFERINGS

The renowned Margaret River Region has seen a number of new offerings added to it's ever-growing list of incredible food and wine experiences.

Frui Momento is the highly anticipated joint venture between award-winning chef Seth James (former head chef at Wills Domain) and winemaker Larry Cherubino, located in the Margaret River region.

The restaurant – which opened in January 2022 – offers a contemporary, pared back menu with a choice of two or three courses focusing on local produce with an Asian influence.

The restaurant also features an alfresco champagne lounge – serving caviar, seafood and charcuterie, and a cocktail bar, and offers sweeping views over rose gardens, grape vines and a lake.



In Busselton, the former head chef and head gardener from one of the world's best restaurants, the three-Michelin-star Noma restaurant in Copenhagen, have recently opened their own restaurant. Alberta's is a cosy 50-seat café and store currently offering locally sourced coffee and baked goods, with plans to slowly introduce a lunch offering to the dining room, followed by dinner, with a rotating menu that focuses on seasonal produce sourced from the region.

Overlooking the shores of Yallingup Beach, Lagoon Yallingup is a new restaurant, kiosk and bar serving up local seafood fare in a relaxed beachside setting. Set across two levels, it offers ideal coastal views to enjoy breakfast, lunch, dinners and drinks.

Small-batch artisan winemaker Amato Vino has opened a new cellar door in the town of Witchcliffe. Producing lo-fi and minimal intervention wines in the region since 2003, the new Tasting Bar is located in the heritage-listed Darnell's Trader building, offering guests a cosy and intimate tasting space.

Gralyn Estate has recently reopened its original underground cellar door to offer a new intimate and premium wine tasting experience. The winery was the first in the region to open a cellar door in 1978, and the original cellar door had been closed for many years since a new modern cellar door was built. Guests now have the opportunity to go behind the scenes for the rare opportunity to taste museum wines dating back to 1980.

Earn Your Vino is a new all-inclusive and immersive wine tour experience designed to allow quests the opportunity to follow the region's seasonal winemaking calendar. These high-end, small-group luxury experiences provide exclusive behind the scenes access to winemakers and producers, as wells as accommodation and experiences, and are privately catered by one of the region's most awarded chefs. Bespoke all-inclusive multi-night packages are currently available for the Margaret River Region, and also Pemberton and Manjimup in the Southern Forests.



CORAL COAST OFFERINGS

New Leaf Connect is a new tour operator offering guests the opportunity to disconnect from the hustle and bustle and reconnect with the expanse of the Mid-West region, with half and full day, seasonal tours and multi-night adventures available. Explore the history of twin towns Dongara and Port Denison, discover edible produce from the local region and sample awardwinning rum and gin at Dongara's Illegal Tender Rum Co distillery on a Taste of Irwin tour, or go inland to see a working cattle station on a multi-night station or farm stay. Seasonal offerings include a range of wildflower themed tours, as well as sea lion safaris in Jurien Bay, and jet ski tours in Geraldton

Dirk Hartog Island Life Adventures is now offering day trips to explore one of WA's most unique national parks – Dirk Hartog Island, located off the coast of Shark Bay. Guests will jump aboard the vessel 100% Wild Adventure from Denham, taking in spectacular ocean views before landing on Dirk Hartog Island to enjoy beach walks, kayaking and exploring the Homestead, before heading off on a guided tour.


Explore the island's pastoral history, or book a four-wheel-drive tour to the west side of the island to view the spectacular landscape, and visit the blowholes and Surf Point marine sanctuary.

At Bullara Station, an authentic outback station stay located between Coral Bay and Exmouth, gateways to the Ningaloo Reef, two new luxury bell-style glamping tents and safari huts have been added to the accommodation offering. Fully furnished with bedding and linen, the safari huts also include a kitchenette, ensuite and are air-conditioning. The station has also welcomed 60 new camping and caravan sites, as well as new ablution block with hot water system, a shearing shed hub, upgraded power systems and a commercial kitchen and café.

In Exmouth, a new project at Ningaloo Lighthouse is currently going through the stages of approvals. Owned by Tattarang, proposed Ningaloo Lighthouse the Resort will entail an \$85 million-dollar redevelopment of the existing caravan park facilities to create an eco-focused resort that will accommodate up to 550 guests across a mix of eco tents, villas, hotel rooms and caravan sites. Powered by renewable energy, the resort will use wastewater recycling, have no single-use plastics onsite and use a bio-digester, preventing 60 tonnes of food waste from going to landfill (and generating 10 tonnes of fertiliser) each year. Onsite facilities will include restaurants, bars, pools, spa, tennis courts and a shop.

In the Shark Bay World Heritage Area, researchers have recently made the incredible discovery it is home to the world's largest plant. Genetic testing has revealed that what was thought to be a giant seagrass meadow in the shallow waters of Shark Bay, is actually a single massive clone of Posidonia australis seagrass.

About 4,500 years old and measuring 180 kilometres, according to researchers it is the single largest plant known to exist on Earth. Shark Bay's vast seagrass beds are the largest and richest in the world, covering 103,000 hectares. The waters are also home to one of the world's largest dugong populations who feed off the seagrass, as well as being a haven for green and loggerhead turtles.



BROOME BOOM

Broome's Town Beach precinct has been transformed thanks to a \$24 million redevelopment. The final stages of the project - the new fishing jetty - was completed in November 2021. The 112-metre accessible jetty is built on the former site of the historical Broome jetty, and allows Broome locals and visitors to walk out over Roebuck Bay, access small vessels, enjoy the Staircase to the Moon events and try their luck at fishing. Other development completed in the Town Beach project include a new grassed terrace area - the location of Broome's popular night markets, and another Staircase to the Moon viewing location, and a children's playground and water park. The final stages of the revitalisation of Broome's historic and nationally iconic Chinatown precinct are now also complete, breathing new life into the town's cultural and historic heart.

Overlooking Roebuck Bay with prime waterfront views, Discovery Park's Broome Holiday & Caravan Park is currently undergoing a \$15 million redevelopment. The first stage is was completed in July 2022, with 15 new deluxe studio cabins and a new resort pool now open. The second stage expected to be completed in time for the 2023 season.

The Continental Hotel reopened in 2021 after an extensive refurbishment, having been acquired by WA-based company the Prendiville Group. Affectionately known as The Conti, the hotel is also home to the recently opened Papá Fuego –

a South American themed small bar and restaurant that captures Broome's tropical setting. The kitchen's flame grill is the feature for all of the dishes on the menu, and the drinks list includes a signature range of tropical inspired cocktails and an extensive wine list.

Based in Broome, Spinifex Brewing Co is WA's first part Aboriginal and veteranowned craft brewery. The brewery opened its first exclusive tap venue in August 2021 - Wild Flower Broome, a tapas bar and restaurant located on the redeveloped Town Beach foreshore precinct. The Broome brewery, which creates craft brews infused with native Australian botanicals such as Gubinge (Kakadu Plum) and Lemon Myrtle, has also proposed to open a new multi-million dollar alehouse venue at Broome's iconic Cable Beach, catering for up to 600 guests in a relaxed family friendly environment

Broome Cruises started operating a new deluxe dining experience on the water for the 2021 season. The half-day Sunset, Seafood & Pearling Cruise is the only one of its kind in Australia, and showcases the region's unique character, exquisite local cuisine, pearling heritage and magical sunsets. The all-inclusive half-day experience includes a seven-course menu showcasing fresh Kimberley seafood, and a hands-on pearl oyster harvest experience with Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm.

Broome Tours added a new Mud Crabbing Adventure to its tour offering in 2022, allowing visitors to experience the thrill of catching a prized Kimberley Mud Crab.

The tour begins with a catamaran cruise of Roebuck Bay to reach the mouth of Broome's incredible creek systems. Experienced guides will then demonstrate the tips and tricks for catching a 'muddy' before being taken through the mangroves to cast and pull pots to catch their own. The tour ends with a feast of freshly cooked chilli mud crab on the cruise back through Roebuck Bay.

For the 2022 season, Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm on the Dampier Peninsular launched 15 brand new glamping eco tents. Featuring private ensuites and king sized beds, the air-conditioned tents allow Cygnet Bay to extend its season and operate year-round. Built to be eco-friendly with minimal impact on the surrounding environment, the new glamping tents are located an easy walking distance to the pool and restaurant, with wheelchair accessible tents also available.

In 2022 Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm also partnered with Broome's Moontide Distillery to release the first gin in the world to use pearl oyster as a botanical. The Pearler's Gin is distilled with juniper berries, Burdekin plum, lemon myrtle, mint and oyster mantle - which is a by-product from the cultured pearling process, giving the gin a unique minerality and umami taste. The mantle is harvested at the same time as the pearl meat and mother of pearl shell, once the final pearl has been collected from the oyster, ensuring that all parts of the pearl oyster are used and reinforcing the reason why pearls are considered the most sustainable gems in the world.



NEW ACCOMMODATION IN ESPERANCE

The coastal town of Esperance in WA's Golden Outback region welcomed the opening of RAC Esperance Holiday Park in December 2021. The newly refurbished holiday park features 170 shady powered campsites, including eight with private ensuite bathrooms, two and three bedroom self-contained family villas, and four studio rooms for couples and small families. Facilities include a state-of-the-art camp kitchen, large indoor recreation room, resort style swimming pool, playground, and outdoor barbeque areas.

Guests are also able to bring their furry friends, with two pet friendly cabins and an onsite dog wash available. Esperance is an eight hour drive south-east from Perth, or a 1.5 hour flight. The popular holiday town is home to some of the best beaches in Australia, with the pristine white sands and turquoise waters of Cape Le Grand National Park right on its doorstep.




HIKING & BIKING IN WA

The outdoor adventure playground of Collie, nestled in the Darling Ranges in the State's South West, continues to transform into a recreation and adventure tourism hub, with the Wellington National Park expanded by over 7,000 hectares, and the completion he Stage One of the new Wambenger Trails Wellington Mountain Bike Trails. The first 15 kilometre stagekilometres of the region's new mountain bike trails network. Keen mountain bikers can now enjoy the newly opened Wellington National Park trails, with Stage One now completed and opened. opened in 2021, with another new 10-kilometre Kylie Trail opening in August 2022. The project will ultimately see 120nearly 110 kilometres of new mountain bike trails, including further trails in Wellington National Park, Westralia Conservation Park Arklow forest block and Collie, all in WA's South West. In addition, facilities at the Wellington Damn mega-mural are being improved to cater

for the increase in visitors. The combination of an expanded park and the improved trail network provides opportunity for Collie to become a recognised 'trail town' - with quality trails, outdoor experiences, facilities and services such as accommodation, hospitality, visitor information and more.

Further south in the town of Nannup, a new mountain bike park is currently being constructed. Once complete, the Nannup Tank 7 Mountain Bike Park will attract mountain bike enthusiasts each year to explore over 35 kilometres of fresh trails. Designed to maximise Nannup's unique natural elevation and make the most of its picturesque landscape including tall timber forests. The park will also offer trails to suit a range of abilities.

In the Kimberley, visitors will be able to experience one of the last true wilderness areas on Earth on a luxury small group walking tour with Walk into Luxury. Launching for the 2023 season (April to September), the signature 4 Day Kimberley Walk includes a three-night stay at one of Australia's Luxury Lodges, El Questro Homestead. The four-day Kimberley Walk includes a scenic flight from Kununurra to Mitchell Plateau, including a heli-hiking experience at Mitchell Falls; guided hikes to Emma Gorge and El Questro Gorge waterfall; exclusive use of Zebedee Springs thermal pools; sunset drinks at a scenic gorge lookout; bird watching experience; plus all meals, drinks and ground transfers.



ECOTOURISM & SUSTAINABLE TRAVEL

WA will soon be home to the world's longest electric highway, with a network of almost 100 new electric vehicle fast charging stations and back-up charges at 49 different locations over the coming years. The charging stations will connect Perth and regional WA – stretching north to Kununurra, south to Esperance and east to Kalgoorlie, with the average distance between charging stations around 160 kilometres. Each location will have a standard fast charger, allowing drivers to top up their electric vehicles in as little as 15 minutes. The world's longest continuous EV fast-charging is expected to be completed and fully operational by 2024.

Electric vehicles can now cross the Nullarbor, thanks to BiØfil plugging the gap between Western Australia and South Australia on the 90 Mile Straight. Remotely located at Caiguna Roadhouse in the Golden Outback, the worldfirst EV station is powered using vegetable oil from roadhouse deep fryers.

A new innovative partnership will see the introduction of zero-emission flights serving some of WA's most iconic tourism attractions across the Kimberley, Pilbara, Golden Outback and Perth regions, set to take off as early as 2026. Leading WA-based aviation and tourism businesses Aviair and HeliSpirit have partnered with global company Eve Air Mobility, an Embraer Group, to bring a fleet of up to 50 new zero-emission electric aircraft to WA within the next four years.

The electric vertical take-off and landing (eVOLT) aircraft, which can carry up to four passengers, are able to land and take-off vertically, offering the convenience of a helicopter with the speed and comfort of a similar sized fixed-wing aircraft. The Margaret River Region has recently become Western Australia's first certified ECO Destination, and only one of four in Australia. Through this globally recognised certification program, visitors are assured the region has a range of high-quality nature-based tourism products and a strong commitment to improving sustainable practices into the future. Driven by the Shire of Augusta Margaret River, and supported by the Margaret River Busselton Tourism Association, 26 businesses across the region are now ECO Certified.

Margaret River Discovery Company, Blackwood River Houseboats, Fair Harvest Permaculture and Tanah Marah are the latest to receive the certification, alongside the likes of the Margaret River Retreat, Margaret River Surf School, Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse, and Jewel, Mammoth and Lake Caves. In addition to this, around 68 wineries across the Margaret River region are certified members of Sustainable Wine Growing Australia, with 12 per cent of vineyards certified organic or biodynamic.

Disconnect from the day-to-day and immerse in the tranquillity of nature at one of the many sustainably focussed accommodation offerings that are popping up in secluded forests, valleys and fields across WA.

Heyscape is a unique accommodation concept offering cosy and secluded tiny cabins in off-grid locations surrounded by nature less than a few hours' drive from Perth. A new family-sized cabin has recently come online near the town of Toodyay, with a further two tiny cabins opening near the town later in the year.

In the South West, experience the true relaxation of off-the-grid boutique stays set amongst forests and fields at new properties such as Serenity Gully near Bridgetown, Stillwood Retreat and Upland Farm in Denmark, Latitude 35°5 in Albany,

Ampersand Estates in Pemberton, Binya Maya Yallingup Escape, Petite Eco Cabin, Barn Hives, and Tree Chalets in the Margaret River region.

Set among unspoilt environments, eco-friendly properties such as Sal Salis at Ningaloo Reef, Petit Eco Cabin and Barn Hives in the Margaret River region, Eco Beach Resort near Broome, Karijini Eco Retreat in Karijini National Park, and Faraway Bay in the Kimberley all feature sustainable materials and are designed to respect the surrounding pristine landscapes.

Karijini Eco Retreat, which offers safari-style eco tents, cabins and campsites in the heart of the spectacular Karijini National Park, has recently added three new luxury eco tents to its eco-friendly accommodation offering. The new glamping tents feature a bespoke design, with furnishings of natural wood and leather, king sized bed with linen, a private ensuite bathroom, front and rear decks, local Aboriginal artwork, and a spacious interior with pristine views over the national park.

There are also a number of minimal impact glamping sites located across WA's regions, including Mile End Glamping, Two Blind Cows and Olio Bello in Margaret River, El Questro's Emma Gorge Resort, Bungle Bungle Savannah Lodge in Purnululu National Park, Sal Salis Ningaloo Reef, APT Wilderness Lodges at Mitchell Falls, Bell Gorge and Purnululu National Park, and the recently opened Heavenly Waters in the Avon Valley region.

Work is also underway to develop new environmentally sensitive accommodation and tourism experiences in WA's national parks. A total of \$17.7 million has been committed towards the development of 'shovel ready' accommodation sites around the State to encourage the development of eco lodges, retreats and other unique accommodation offerings; as well as new tourism experiences in national parks and nearby towns.

DARK SKY **TOURISM**

Dark Sky Tourism is defined as travelling to destinations to experience the night sky free from artificial night pollution. WA's environmental characteristics. unique epic landscapes and endless night skies means there is no shortage of stargazing opportunities for visitors. Take advantage of WA's big skies on one of the number of tourism operators offering astronomybased adventures.

Based in Perth, Off the Beaten Track offers moon gazing hikes during a rising full moon, and stargazing hikes where guests can hike to a lookout point in the Perth Hills to view the night sky through a telescope. Lumineer Tours take quests to the otherworldly Pinnacles in Nambung National Park and use the latest in astronomy equipment to offer the ultimate star gazing experience, and in Mandurah, Salt and Bush Eco Tours are now offering wildlife nocturnal tours and stargazing nights at the Thrombolites in Lake Clifton

In WA's Coral Coast region, experience the magic of the night sky whilst perched 100 metres above the mighty Murchison River on the Kalbarri Skywalk with D'Guy Charters, and in Broome gaze at the wonders of the universe with Space Gandalf (aka Greg Quicke) from Astro Tours using big telescopes and lasers.

Astrotourism WA also hosts a number of stargazing events each year that visit regional areas throughout WA, recognised Astrophotography Hot Spots such as The Pinnacles in Nambung National Park

Aboriginal Australians are often credited with being the world's first astronomers, as the stars have been used for navigation, calendars, ceremony, cultural lore, song-lines and art for thousands of years. In 2023, Balanggarra Home Valley in the east Kimberley region will be offering star gazing tours with an Aboriginal guide. Guests will use state-of-theart telescopes and equipment and – thanks to some of the lowest light pollution in the world - the naked eye to view the majestic star-scape of Balanggarra Home Valley.

Ningaloo Eclipse - on April 20, 2023 visitors to Exmouth in the World Heritage-listed Ningaloo region will have front row seats for one of nature's most phenomenal occurrences - a total solar eclipse. At around 11:27am those in the region will experience 62 seconds of totality as the sun is completely blocked by the moon. The path of totality will graze the tip of WA in a 40-kilometre wide track near Exmouth. making it the most accessible land-based place on Earth to view the spectacle. Whilst Exmouth is in complete darkness for just over a minute, the rest of WA will experience a partial solar eclipse. Those in Perth will witness a 72 per cent eclipse, Geraldton about 80 per cent, Carnarvon 97 per cent, Karratha 97 per cent, and Coral Bay and Onslow will see a 99 per cent eclipse. WA is one of the very few land places worldwide where people can view the natural phenomenon, with the next solar eclipse to take place in WA 2031.



AVIATION NEWS

A new direct Qantas flight between Perth and Rome took off in June 2022. The direct Boeing 787 Dreamliner service is currently the only non-stop link between Australia and continental Europe. Departing three times a week until October 6, 2022, Qantas has since confirmed that the new seasonal route will return in 2023 for the northern summer. Onwards from Rome, connecting flights are available to 16 European destinations, including Amsterdam, Athens, Barcelona, Frankfurt, Madrid and Paris as well as a further 15 destinations in Italy such as Milan and Venice.

This new direct service complements the return of Qantas' direct flight from London to Perth, which began operating daily again in May 2022.

Qantas will also launch a new Johannesburg to Perth direct flight in November 2022, along with a direct Jakarta to Perth flight in the same month.

Exploring one of WA's most diverse destinations is now easier thanks to Jetstar's new direct flights between Melbourne and Busselton in the Margaret River region, which took off in April 2022. The new direct flights to Australia's premium wine region will operate Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays.



CRUISING NEWS

WA is one of the world's largest states and with more than 12,000 kilometres of coastline, it's a perfect cruising destination. Expedition cruising in the Kimberley allows guests to experience one of the world's last true wilderness areas. Multi-day, all-inclusive experiences range from boutique vessels filled with Australian charm to big boat comforts complete with five-star service. Historians, naturalists and geologists who travel on board many vessels guide excursions, unlocking the country's secrets - including galleries of Aboriginal rock art.

Luxury touring company APT has launched a number of new small ship expedition cruise along WA's coast aboard the 99-passenger MS Caledonian Sky. The eight-day South West Coast Explorer departs from Fremantle to discover Margaret River's fine wineries, spectacular scenery, and the iconic Cape to Cape Track, as well as historic Albany and Lucky Bay in Cape Le Grand National Park. Further north, the Colours of the Coral and Kimberley Coast is a new 21-day cruise from Perth to Broome, stopping in at Kalbarri National Park, Ningaloo Reef to swim with the mighty whale shark, as well as Cable Beach in Broome.

There is also a shorter 15-day option, Colours of the Coral Coast, which includes most of the highlights. The Kimberley Coast Encounter is a new seven-day return cruise from Broome which explores the turquoise water of the Buccaneer Archipelago, including a fast boat ride through the Horizontal Falls.

WA-based luxury expedition cruise ship True North has also released a new South West itinerary. Adventure South West departs from Esperance, where guests will wonder at the endless picturesque beaches that skirt Cape Le Grand. Highlights include spotting Orcas at Bremer Canyon, sampling wine in the Margaret River region, and visiting Perth's island playground Rottnest.

Luxury small ship cruise operator PONANT will bring a new level of luxury to the Kimberley expedition cruising experience for the 2023 season. Partnering with Paspaley Group, the new seven to 14-night bespoke itinerary will see guests sailing through the ancient wonders of the Kimberley coast on-board the newly refurbished iconic three-masted sailing yacht the Le Ponant – which offers 16 staterooms for a maximum of 32 guests.

Adding to the unique experience, an exclusive and private scenic flight on-board one of Paspaley's vintage Grumman Mallard flying boats will take guests from or to their embarkation point, and guests will also experience private access to Paspaley's pearl operations in Kuri Bay.

EPIC EVENTS CALENDAR

WA plays host to an incredible range of world-class cultural, arts, sporting and culinary events throughout the year.

In an Australian first, a series of enormous wooden sculptures will be installed south of Perth this year. Created by renowned Danish artist Thomas Dambo, and standing at around five metres tall, Thomas Dambo's Sculptures in Western Australia are intended to be protectors of the environment, and will each have their own distinct personality.

Located in Mandurah and the wider Peel region, visitors will be encouraged to explore and discover these installations at five secret locations when it opens to the public in November 2022. An artist of international acclaim, Dambo has exhibited extensively throughout the world, and his practice celebrates the diversity, beauty and importance of the natural world - with his works all handmade using recycled materials.

On the culinary calendar, Shore Leave Festival will celebrate WA seafood in the town of Geraldton from April 27 to May 1, and in the heart of truffle country, Manjimup will host an incredible line-up of Australia's top culinary talent when Truffle Kerfuffle returns in June 2023.

In the State's North West, the Boab Metals Ord Valley Muster (May 13 to 22) will shine a spotlight on the culture and extraordinary natural landscapes of the eastern Kimberley region; and Broome's annual Shinju Matsuri (festival of the pearl), will return in 2023 celebrate the town's unique multicultural and pearling history (August to September).

For sporting fans, Perth's state-of-the-art Optus Stadium is set to host the ICC Men's T20 Cricket World Cup from October 16 to November 13; and the World Surf League's annual Margaret River Pro is set to return in 2023 (April to May).

The world's most beautiful stadium is also home to Australian Rules Football (AFL), with the Fremantle Dockers and West Coast Eagles taking on their rivals during the 2023 AFL season.

Other standout events to keep an eye on include the annual FRINGE World Festival (January to February) and Perth Festival (February to March), which both deliver a vibrant program of live music, theatre, visual arts, comedy, dance and family friendly events throughout Perth's festival of summer.

Sculpture by the Sea turns the iconic Cottesloe Beach into a stunning sculpture park during the month of March.

NINGALOO REEF

Easily accessible from shore, you don't need to travel by boat to snorkel this World Heritage-listed underwater wonderland. The world's largest fringing mainland reef is home to brilliantly coloured coral and tropical fish, sea turtles and manta rays, plus one of the world's top shore dives at Exmouth's Navy Pier. Whale sharks and humpback whales visit each year, and visitors are able to swim with the gentle giants of the ocean, with tours operating out of Coral Bay and Exmouth, traditional owners of the Jinigudera, Baiyungo and Thalanyji people.

BUNGLE BUNGLE RANGE

In the Kimberley, another World Heritage gem, Purnululu National Park on Gija and Jaru country, is home to the otherworldly Bungle Bungle Range – a cluster of 350-million-year-old giant, beehive-like striped mounds. Scenic flights offer breathtaking views, and you can explore the park's long narrow chasms and hidden gorges on foot, keeping an eye out for native animals and 130 unique bird species.

SHARK BAY

Awarded World Heritage status for its outstanding natural beauty, biological diversity, fascinating ecology and unique insights into the Earth's history, Shark Bay (Gutharraguda) and surrounding Malgana Country is where you'll find one of the world's largest dugong populations, the world's largest plant in the seagrass meadows, and Monkey Mia's friendly dolphins.

You can experience pristine waters and one of only two beaches in the world formed entirely of tiny white shells, or time travel with the oldest living fossils – the stromatolites at Hamelin Pool. Francois Peron National Park is a colourful wilderness adventure, where red desert cliffs meet the turquoise sea.

VALLEY OF THE GIANTS

Experience some of the tallest trees on Earth at canopy level – 40 metres above ground – at the Valley of the Giants Treetop Walk, near Walpole in the South West. One of the first walk trails of its kind in the world, the 600-metre walkway extends through the majestic and ancient red tingle forest where you may be able to spot western grey kangaroos, bandicoots, woylies and quokkas.

KARIJINI NATIONAL PARK

Two billion years in the making, Karijini on Banyjima, Kurrama and Innawonga Country in the North West is home to massive gorges, crystal-clear rock pools and waterfalls, as well as rock wallabies, red kangaroos, echidnas, and huge termite mounds. Explore tunnels of marbled rock, clamber over boulders, squeeze through narrow tunnels, paddle through waterways and descend deep into ancient chasms.



STOP AND SEE THE WILDFLOWERS

It's a staggering sight to behold – more than 12,000 species of wildflowers in bloom, more than half of which are found nowhere else on Earth. The wildflower season lasts for six months, commencing in June in the north and sweeps down the State to finish with a flurry on the south coast in November.

KALBARRI NATIONAL PARK

Known for its magnificent deep red and white banded gorges, created over 400 million years from the flow of the Murchison River, the popular national park – located in near the coastal getaway town of Kalbarri – has recently welcomed a spectacular new skywalk experience. The 100-metre high Kalbarri Skywalk provides stunning vistas of the Murchison River Gorge, extending 17 and 25 metres beyond the gorge rim at the Inyaka Wookai Watju (West Loop).


KINGS PARK AND BOTANIC GARDEN

One of the world's largest inner-city parks, this 400-hectare expanse of bushland, parks and botanical gardens is a short walk or bus ride from central Perth. Add with its children's nature-based play areas, an art gallery, restaurants and monuments to the State's history, as well as outdoor concerts, theatre and movies in summer, it's easy to see Kings Park (Kaarta Koomba) is the most popular visitor destination in WA.

THE PINNACLES

The lunar-like Pinnacles form one of Australia's most unique and otherworldly natural landscapes. Formed over millions of years, thousands of tall limestone spires rise eerily from the yellow desert sands of Nambung National Park, changing colours in different lights.





FITZGERALD RIVER NATIONAL PARK

One of only a handful of UNESCO Biosphere Reserves, this 300,000 hectare national park is WA's own lost world – three-quarters of its 1,800 species of plants are found nowhere else on Earth, and share the environment with 84 bird species, 22 mammal species and more than 50 reptile and frog species. Located on the south coast, it is a perfect spot for bushwalking, wildflower spotting, canoeing, fishing and whale watching.

HORIZONTAL FALLS

Talbot Bay in the Kimberley is home to Australia's only horizontal waterfalls, created when massive tidal movements squeeze water through narrow cliff passages. Aerial tours from Broome and Derby enable you to circle the Horizontal Falls (Garaanngaddim) phenomenon from above, alongside other scenic wonders of the Buccaneer Archipelago, where turquoise blue water contrasts with rugged red cliffs. You can also land and see the falls up close by speed boat, with the option of staying overnight on a houseboat



ANCIENT CAVES

In the Margaret River Region, extraordinary network of over 100 limestone caves lay beneath the surface of the Leeuwin Naturaliste Ridge on Wardandi Noongar Country. Venture underground on a guided or self-guided tour and marvel at the reflections on Lake Cave's permanent lake, be dwarfed in Jewel Cave's enormous chambers and go at your own pace inside Mammoth Cave. At Ngilgi Cave, marvel at the incredible stalactites and stalagmites, learn about the caves fascinating history or be mesmerised by a didgeridoo performance from an Aboriginal guide.

SURF A WAVE ROCK

Wave Rock (Katter Kich), near Hyden on Ballardong country, is a remarkable 110-metre-long, multi-coloured granite cliff that rises 15 metres from the ground and resembles a huge wave about to crash into the bush. Otherworldly encounters continue at nearby Mulka's Cave with its incredible collection of Aboriginal rock art.

THE DERBAL YERRIGAN


Sitting pretty on its banks, Perth's Swan River (Derbal Yerrigan) is one of WA's most celebrated and historic natural assets. Throughout the year visitors and locals alike will walk, cycle, jog or picnic along its shores. River cruises, ferry rides, fast boat and waterbike tours allow you to experience the city from a different perspective. Cruise the calm waters to the port city of Fremantle on a scenic lunch tour, or head to its upper reaches to sample the delights of the Swan Valley – WA's oldest wine region and the only one in Australia that can be accessed via river from a capital city.


CAPE RANGE NATIONAL PARK

Where the outback meets the reef, Cape Range National Park is a spectacular landscape of rugged limestone ranges, breathtaking deep canyons and 60 kilometres of pristine turquoise beaches that are home to the underwater wonders of World Heritage-listed Ningaloo Reef. Wildflowers and wildlife are abundant, with over 630 species of plants and more than 100 species of land birds and native marsupials. Cruise along Yardie Creek on a boat tour and spot rock wallabies, or take a hike along Shothole Canyon or Charles Knife Canyon for spectacular scenic views.

WATERFALL WONDERS

The replenishing tropical summer rains send waterfalls thundering and cascading throughout the ancient wilderness landscapes of the Kimberley region, creating inviting rock pools and enchanting oases of plant and animal life. The best time of year to witness these waterfall wonders is early in the year, with a number of springfed falls that flow year-round. Favourites include the spectacular four-tiered Mitchell Falls (Punamii-unpuu), the thundering King George Falls, the terraced Kings Cascade that fan out across the rocks, and popular Bell Gorge which can be accessed along the Gibb River Road. Scenic flights offer aweinspiring aerial views, or take a heli-hike to experience them up close. For the ultimate waterfall experience a Kimberley expedition cruise is a must





SWIMMING WITH GENTLE GIANTS

Exhilarating marine experiences await at World Heritage-listed Ningaloo Reef one of only a handful of places on Earth where you can swim with the world's biggest fish, the whale shark, and the majestic humpback whale. Whale sharks visit Ningaloo - traditional owners of the Jinigudera, Baiyungo and Thalanyji people - each year between March and July. Tours from Exmouth and Coral Bay will take you into the reef's turquoise waters for an unforgettable encounter with these gentle giants. Humpback whale interaction tours run from July to October, while upclose tours with another big and beautiful Ningaloo local, the manta ray, operate yearround

MEET THE WORLD'S HAPPIEST ANIMAL

Just off the coast of Perth lies Rottnest Island (Wadjemup), an island playground for visitors and locals, and home to the world's happiest animal – the friendly quokka. Found only in Western Australia, these cute marsupials roam care-free on the car free island and Class A-Reserve. Known for pulling a cute grin for the camera, these photogenic furry animals have become a social media sensation in recent years – just be sure to follow quokka etiquette when getting that winning shot.

GET UP CLOSE WITH WILD DOLPHINS

Perth Wild Encounters (45 minutes from Perth) and the redeveloped Dolphin Discovery Centre in Bunbury (two hours south of Perth) – offer the chance to swim with wild bottlenose dolphins. The playful and curious animals may choose to approach the boat and swimmers, providing a unique, up-close encounter. Monkey Mia (850 kilometres north of Perth), on Malgana Country, is famous for friendly bottlenose dolphins that regularly visit the shore, while further north in Broome (Rubibi), boat tours enable visitors to see Australia's largest known population of the rare snubfin dolphin.



ONE OF THE WORLD'S LONGEST WHALE WATCHING SEASONS

WA is home to the 'humpback highway' as 30,000 gentle giants move up and down the west coast during the Southern Hemisphere's largest whale migration. WA has one of the world's longest whale watching seasons - from May to December - and a range of tours and coastal lookouts will help you spot humpbacks, southern right and even blue whales. September to late-November is the prime time for whale tours off Perth (Fremantle, Hillarys and Rottnest Island), while other hotspots include Albany, the Margaret River region (Augusta, Dunsborough and Busselton), Broome, Geraldton, Exmouth, Denham, Kalbarri, and Esperance.

TRIP OF A LIFETIME - ORCA CONGREGATION

On Western Australia's south coast, the Bremer Canyon's marine-rich pocket attracts hundreds of orcas (killer whales) between January and April. Tours operate from Bremer Bay with Naturaliste Charters and Whale Watch WA, providing guests the opportunity to see a plethora of marine life, including other whales, seals, seabirds and giant squid. Learn about the fascinating research into the endangered species and join the researchers in observing and photographing the highly social family groups and larger pods.

TURTLE NESTING IN NINGALOO

The Ningaloo Coast World Heritage Area is one of the world's major breeding areas for sea turtles. From November to March both green and loggerhead turtles will make their arduous journey up the beach to lay their eggs, then about six weeks later the hatchlings emerge, usually around dusk, dawn or through the night, and make their dash to the sea. Visit the Jurabi Turtle Centre for a guided turtle spotting tour to find females making their way up the beach, or turtle hatchlings emerging from their nests.

KIMBERLEY BIRD SPOTTING

In the Kimberley region, excellent bird spotting opportunities await enthusiasts year-round. Broome's Roebuck Bay (Yawuru Nadulagun) in the North West is regarded as one of the best spots in Australia to view shore birds, with an estimated 175,000 birds roosting and feeding there every year before returning to their arctic breeding grounds. Over 325 species are recorded in the region, with all of their distinct habitats found relatively close to Broome town. In Kununurra (Goonoonoorrang) and the eastern Kimberley region, keep an eye out for dancing Brolgas, the water-walking Comb-crested Jacanas, Magpie geese and Australia's indigenous stork, the Jabiru.

KANGAROOS TO CROCODILES - OTHER WILDLIFE ENCOUNTERS

An easy day-trip from Perth takes you to Penguin Island near Rockingham, where you can see and learn about WA's largest colony of adorable little penguins. The surrounding Shoalwater Marine Park is also home to seabirds and the rare Australian sea lion. Jurien Bay Marine Park, a three hour drive north of Perth, is another marine life hot-spot, while at Hamelin Bay near Augusta you can get close to smooth stingrays, black stingrays and eagle rays in the shallow water. In Esperance, on WA's south-east coast, Lucky Bay's local kangaroos like to sunbathe on the white sand, while nearby Woody Island is a haven for New Zealand fur seals, Australian sea lions, sea eagles and dolphins. In the State's far north, an experienced guide can help you spot mighty saltwater crocodiles and their freshwater cousins from a safe distance in the Kimberley.

DRYANDRA WOODLAND NATIONAL PARK

Western Australia's newest national park, located near the town of Narrogin in the Wheatbelt region, Dryandra Woodland is one of the best places for spotting the native numbat. It is also home to more than 100 species of birds and 24 mammals, including some of Australia's rarest and most vulnerable wildlife such woylies, brushtail wallabies, chuditch, and quenda.

WORLD-LEADING WINES

From Perth to the rugged Southern Ocean coast, WA is home to nine wine regions, which can all be explored on a range of guided wine tours:

- Regarded as Australia's premium wine region, Margaret River is renowned worldwide for producing top quality, award-winning wines, amongst and some of the most scenic vineyard country on Earth. The region's first commercial vineyards were planted more than 50 years ago, with Chardonnay and Cabernet Sauvignon the heroes of the region.
- Along WA's scenic south coast, Albany, Denmark, Frankland River, Mt Barker and Porongurup are highlights of the Great Southern wine region, which is particularly well known for its exceptional Riesling and Cabernet Sauvignon.
- At more than 185 years old, the picturesque Swan Valley is the State's oldest wine growing region. Just 25 minutes from Perth city centre, it's the closest wine region to any capital city in Australia and can be access on a Swan River cruise. Speciality premium wines produced in the Swan Valley include Chenin Blanc, Verdelho, Shiraz and fortified wine.

- A short journey from the city will also take you to the Perth Hills, where local families and progressive vintners produce stand-out Shiraz and Viognier, and the Peel wine region, known for its Chenin Blanc, Chardonnay and Cabernet Sauvignon.
- The Geographe wine region is also starting to turn heads, with a number of boutique wineries popping up in the charming sub-regions of Ferguson Valley, Donnybrook, Capel and Harvey- producing excellent Shiraz, Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc and Semillon.
- In amongst the towering karri forests, the towns of Manjimup and Pemberton in the Southern Forests wine region are renowned for Pinot Noir, and more recently, sparkling wines have been starting to turn heads.

TRUFFLES - A RARE DELICACY

Black truffle is one of the world's most expensive food items, and 70 per cent of the Australian supply comes from Western Australia's tranguil Southern Forests around Manjimup and Pemberton, some 300 kilometres south of Perth. As well as sampling the rare delicacy and learning about its painstaking cultivation, you can watch the Australian Truffle Traders and Truffle Hill's specially trained dogs in action, sniffing out the underground delights on a truffle hunt tour from June to August. In Manjimup each June, a lively festival - Truffle Kerfuffle – presents a weekend of hands-on activities and leading culinary talent in the heart of truffle country.

GRAZE YOUR WAY THROUGH PERTH'S RESTAURANTS

With an influx of new hotels came the opening of signature restaurants across the city. Enjoy fine dining at venues such as Hearth at The Ritz-Carlton Perth, Nobu at Crown Perth, Santini Bar & Grill at QT Perth, Garum at The Westin and Wildflower at COMO The Treasury. Other new and trending dining options creating a foodie buzz include Fleur, Double Rainbow, Le Rebelle, Will Street, Lotus, TOMA, Nieuw Ruin, Casa, Cooee and Dandelion.

SAMPLE SUCCULENT SEAFOOD

WA seafood and freshwater fish are among the finest and freshest you'll ever try. Be sure to sample Geraldton and Rottnest's western rock lobster; South West marron, yabby and trout; North West barramundi; Exmouth prawns; Shark Bay scallops; Mandurah crab; Fremantle octopus; Albany akoya oysters, and; Broome pearl meat. Add in a sunset view and a cool boutique beer or a crisp local wine, and it's a true west coast experience. You can learn about the State's rock lobster industry in Geraldton and Cervantes, or hook your own catch of the day on deep-sea, game or beach fishing adventures all along the coast.

For a unique seafood experience on the water, Sea West offer luxury dining cruises across the State, from pulling up live western rock lobster off the coast of Rottnest, eating blue swimming crab in Mandurah, experiencing the tastes of the South West in the bays of Dunsborough, to harvesting live pearl oysters and sampling rare pearl meat on the Kimberley Coast in Broome

GET CRAFTY WITH LOCAL BEERS

Fremantle is the birthplace of Australia's flourishing craft beer scene, with the first big-flavour, small-production brews poured at the Sail and Anchor bar. Gage Roads Brewing opened its first public facing venue in January 2022. The popular 100-metre-long venue has taken over the historic portside A Shed building at Fremantle's Victoria Quay. Check out other unique and seasonal craft beers at Fremantle's Little Creatures. Running with Thieves, or Beerpourium. Closer to the city, head for Blasta Brewing Co, Bright Tank, Longneck, Bevy at The Camfield, Otherwise, Nowhereman, Little Island or head up the coast to the Indian Ocean Brewing Company. You can also see how local beers and cold cider are bringing extra flavour and attitude to traditional wine regions such as the Swan Valley (Homestead Brewery, Valley Social or Mash, for example) and Margaret River (Black Brewing Co, Eagle Bay Brewery or Shelter Brewing Company, to name a few). Western Australia is home to more than 80 breweries, so there's a few to work through!

FEAST IN THE FOOD BOWLS

Western Australia's fertile soils and perfect climate make it a haven for horticulturalists, and you can experience 'the State on a plate' at gourmet events or straight from the farm. In the Kimberley, tours of Lake Argyle reveal the massive reservoir's role in the Ord River vast irrigated patchwork, which is a hub for everything from chickpeas and corn to melons and mangoes. Further south, head to the Coral Coast town of Carnarvon to tour banana plantations and meet the farmers behind tropical fruits and vegetables.

In WA's South West, Genuinely Southern Forests offer food and farm tours around Manjimup and Pemberton to sample a smorgasbord of fresh produce such as apples, avocado, cherries, lime and honey, as well as marron and beef.

LAZE LIKE A LOCAL AT A SUNDAY SESSION

Wrap up the weekend the WA way by relaxing with mates on a Sunday afternoon with food, a tipple or two and live music at a waterfront or alfresco-style pub. Perth's top spots for a Sunday Session (or 'sesh' if you want to sound like a local) include the Cottesloe Beach Hotel in Cottesloe, The Standard and Henry Summer in Northbridge, Gage Roads Brewery, Bathers Beach House and The Left Bank in Fremantle and The Breakwater at Hillarys.

JOIN THE NATURAL WINE MOVEMENT

Perth is welcoming an increase in outlets offering naturally produced and minimal intervention wines, including the openings of Wines of While in Northbridge and Madalena's in South Fremantle. The boutique bars offer a range of national and internationally sourced varieties; complemented by the growing number of Western Australian wineries producing organic varieties, such as Blind Corner, L.A.S Vino, Cullen and Dormilona in the Margaret River region, Express Wine Makers in the Great Southern and Swan Valley Wines in the Swan Valley.

REGIONAL AND URBAN DISTILLERIES

Regional small batch distilleries can be found all across Western Australia, from Kununurra in the north to Esperance in the south, each producing its own distinctive character and style. Kununurra in the Kimberley is home to WA's oldest operating legal still, The Hoochery Distillery, famous for its Ord River Rum (and rum cakes!). In Broome, Moontide Distillery produces gins and spirits using native ingredients, and has just released the first gin in the world to use pearl oyster as a botanical. In the Coral Coast town of Geraldton, Illegal Tender Rum Co produces premium rum using only dark brown cane sugar. At Giniversity in the Margaret River region, visitors can make their own gin local native botanicals, and Limeburners near Albany in the Great Southern region produces single malt whisky using premium Western Australian grain and pure Albany water from limestone aguifers. In Esperance on the south-east coast, Esperance Distillery Co produces gin distilled using native botanicals that showcase the floral diversity of Esperance and the Fitzgerald Biosphere. Perth's urban distillery trails are best discovered with Hidden de Tours and Two Feet & a Heartbeat, with the new Republic of Fremantle a highlight with their Swan Valley Verdelho spirit base.



BUSH TUCKER EXPERIENCES

Aboriginal people have been living by the seasons for thousands of years, practicing sustainable hunting and gathering methods and using local foods for medicinal, nutritional and cultural significance. Aboriginal cultural tours will allow you to discover 'nature's supermarket' in each region of Western Australia.

Forage for native bushfoods in Perth on Whadjuk Country, learn traditional fishing methods in the South West on Wardandi Country, and dig for honey ants - the sweetest of bushfoods - in the Golden Outback on Wongatha Country. On the Dampier Peninsula in the Kimberley, the local Bardi people will teach you traditional spear fishing techniques and mud-crab hunting in the mangroves, before you cook the catch on the beach.

A GENEROUS SERVING OF UNFORGETTABLE EVENTS

The State's bounty of fresh local produce is celebrated throughout the year with a number of regional foodie events. In the Margaret River Region, multi-day festivals such as Cabin Fever and Fine Vines celebrate the region's food and wine offerings, and in the nearby Ferguson Valley, Lost & Found showcases the up and coming wine region.

In the south-east corner, Taste Great Southern unearths the incredible variety of produce. In the Coral Coast, sample fresh seafood at Shore Leave Festival in Geraldton and enjoy the region's variety of tropical fruits and vegetables at Gascoyne Food Festival. Broome's Shinju Matsuri celebrates the pearling town's rich multicultural history, and both Ord Valley Muster and the new Taste of the Kimberley shine a spotlight on the tropical agriculture in Kununurra's Ord River Irrigation Scheme. In Perth, the annual Mandurah Crab Fest showcases the native blue manna crab that the Mandurah region is well-known for.


Home to modern museums and galleries, captivating street art, outdoor murals, heritage buildings and the world's oldest living culture – Western Australia's unique art and cultural offerings are reflected in its sheer diversity of natural landscapes and cultural heritage. Here's our WA Dream List of art and culture experiences.

PROCK ART, THE KIMBERLEY

PERTH CULTURAL CENTRE

FWA Museum Boola Bardip

Meaning 'many stories' in local Noongar language, the WA Museum Boola Bardip - which opened to the public after a \$400 million redevelopment in November 2020 - is a landmark building showcasing the State's extraordinary people, places, cultures and stories through state-of-theart technology and innovative exhibits. The museum celebrates Western Australia's rich Aboriginal heritage and landscape, and takes a unique people-first approach to its curation, with the stories and perspectives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people taking centre stage in its exhibitions.





CONNECT WITH ABORIGINAL CULTURE

For over 60,000 years Western Australia's Aboriginal people have lived in harmony with nature, sourcing food, shelter and medicine from the land. Experience their rich cultural heritage as one of the oldest surviving cultures on Earth on one of the many authentic Aboriginal tours operating across the State From the ancient lands of the Kimberley to the cave systems of the South West and stunning coastlines of the Golden Outback - discover Dreamtime stories, forage for traditional bush tucker, and experience the celebrations traditional music and dance. Aboriginal art galleries throughout regional Western Australia showcase the traditional and contemporary works of local, national and international Aboriginal artists; or join an Aboriginal guide to discover ancient rock art galleries, and the largest collection of petroglyphs (rock engravings) in the world.

URBAN STREET ART

Tucked down laneways and splashed across buildings, Perth's captivating street art offers a vibrant glimpse into the heart and soul of the city. New works are appearing regularly across the city as the urban art scene evolves, and in recent years the city has gained worldwide attention with internationally renowned street artists painting the walls of some of the city's iconic and lesser-known buildings. Join a walking tour in Perth, Northbridge or Fremantle to discover the artist stories behind some of these incredible works of art.



HERITAGE BUILDINGS

Travel back in time with a visit to Western Australia's iconic heritage buildings, immersing yourself in the state's gold rush, colonial and pearling histories. Architecture buffs will delight in Perth's colonial-era buildings which sit alongside modern brutalist architecture. Visit the iconic State Buildings, a collection of former heritage government buildings that have been reimagined and reinvigorated as a vibrant civic hub of retail and dining offerings, home to one of Perth's top luxury hotels, COMO the Treasury. Discover convict tales at the Round House in Fremantle - the Swan River Colony's firstever building, or take a step back into Western Australia's gold rush history through the grand monuments and architecture in Kalgoorlie (Karlkurla), or visit Broome's (Rubibi) Chinatown for an insight into the town's rich pearling history.

OUTDOOR GALLERIES & MURALS

The striking salt flats of Lake Ballard near the Golden Outback town of Menzies form the backdrop of Inside Australia - one of Australia's largest outdoor galleries. This truly unique installation of 51 life-sized steel statues by acclaimed sculptor Antony Gormley will celebrate its 20th anniversary in 2023. In a celebration of regional Western Australia, FORM's Public Silo Trail takes art out of galleries, transforming country infrastructure into sites of world-class mural art. Emblazoned across colossal grain silos, transformer boxes and iconic farming infrastructure at seven locations from Perth through the Golden Outback and South West regions, the epic works showcase monumental depictions of each town's community and what makes it unique. In the town of Collie, marvel at the world's biggest dam mural at Wellington Dam. The 8,000 square metre mega-mural Reflections, represents how the waterways are culturally significant to both locals and visitors.

REGIONAL MUSEUMS

In regional towns across Western Australia, many fascinating museums preserve the stories, history and artefacts of our rich culture, landscapes and past. A new online visitwanderland.com.au together brings all of these museums, cultural centres and remarkable private collections together. WAnderland is packed with hidden treasures and tales - from the cultured to the kitsch and everything in between. Head upstairs above a Chinese restaurant in Broome to discover a personal collection of pearling history, experience Aboriginal culture at centres like Bilya Koort Boodja in Northam, or marvel at Australia's largest private collection of shells and coral in the Margaret River Region.

A WORLD HERITAGE-LISTED PRISON

One of Western Australia's most fascinating and significant cultural heritage sites and tourist attractions, Fremantle Prison is the state's only World Heritage-listed building. Built by convicts in the 1850's, the prison was used as a place of incarceration for 136 years before being decommissioned as an operating maximum security gaol in 1991. Now an iconic tourist attraction, visitors can now 'step inside and do time' with Fremantle Prison's experienced guides on a range of tours highlight convict and prison life, daring escapes and colourful characters; or descend 20 metres below the prison to discover the labyrinth of tunnels.


FREMANTLE'S MARITIME STORIES

The port city of Fremantle (Walyalup) is also home to a rich maritime history – which can be discovered at the WA Maritime Museum. ideally located at Fremantle's historic Victoria Quay. The museum houses several unique galleries that explore the moments, voyages and vessels; plus the artefacts, people and stories that shaped Western Australia's maritime relationship. Dive even further into the State's maritime past at the nearby WA Shipwrecks Museum - recognised as the foremost maritime archaeology museum in the southern hemisphere. Steeped in history, the galleries house hundreds of relics from ships wrecked along Western Australia's coastlines over hundreds of years, including the original timbers from the Batavia (wrecked in 1629).

ANZAC HISTORY

The multi-award winning National Anzac Centre in the coastal city of Albany is Australia's foremost museum honouring the Anzac legend. Set within Albany Heritage Park in the South West town, the Centre offers visitors a deeply personal connection Australia's Anzac history, which dates back to 1914 when more than 40,000 Australians and New Zealanders left the shore of Albany, bound for the Great War.







BEACHES & LAKES

The waters off WA's 20,000 kilometres of mainland coastline and islands are some of the most pristine in the world – and home pure-white sands, crystal clear waters, fringing reefs and a myriad of marine life. Here's our WA Dream List of beaches and lakes

A SPARKLING BEACH MENU

Western Australia's beaches are regularly voted among the best in the world, and with 12,500 kilometres of pristine coastline, the sheer diversity and range of different coastal options is like no other destination on Earth. In Perth, there are 19 stunning beaches all located within easy reach of the city - Cottesloe Beach, City Beach and Scarborough Beach are visitor favourites. Venture to the southern corner of WA where the crystal-clear blue waters of the Southern Ocean contrast with granite boulders, rocky outcrops, pure white sand and adjoining green vegetation. Here you'll find Australia's whitest beach, Lucky Bay in Cape Le Grand National Park (Mandoowernup), home to friendly sunbathing kangaroos. The Coral Coast boasts Exmouth's dazzling Turquoise Bay and is where the outback meets the reef, with the World Heritage-listed Ningaloo Reef creating an underwater playground against the rugged gorges of Cape Range National Park. Another World Heritage-listed area, Shark Bay (Gutharraguda) is where you'll find Monkey Mia's friendly dolphins, and a beach made entirely of tiny white shells. In the North West, Broome's (Rubibi) iconic Cable Beach is famous for its golden glow sunsets and camel trains. The colours of the Kimberley coastline are like nowhere else in the world, with its red pindan sands, white beaches and azure blue waters. Here you'll also find incredible untouched wilderness. with the 1000-plus islands of the Buccaneer Archipelago all waiting to be explored on a Kimberley expedition cruise.

PERTH'S PARADISE -ROTTNEST ISLAND

The ferry crossing to Rottnest Island (Wadjemup) takes as little as 30 minutes by ferry, or try something different with a trip by helicopter or small plane. You'll soon have the pleasant dilemma of choosing from "Rotto's" 63 beaches and 20 secluded bays, or being enchanted by the island's unique marsupial resident, the friendly quokka. The car-free island is easy to explore by hire bike, tours, Segway, bus or on foot – or head into the water to see fish, coral and shipwrecks at some of the best snorkelling or diving sites this close to a capital city.

NINGALOO REEF

Easily accessible from shore, you don't need to travel by boat to snorkel this World Heritage-listed underwater wonderland. The massive fringing reef is home to brilliantly coloured coral and tropical fish, sea turtles and manta rays, plus one of the world's top shore dives at Exmouth's Navy Pier. Whale sharks and humpback whales visit each year, and visitors are able to swim with the gentle giants of the ocean, with tours operating out of Coral Bay and Exmouth, traditional owners of the Jinigudera, Baiyungo and Thalanyji people.


MAKE SOME WAVES - SURFING

Take the word of the world's top surfers who flock to WA's shores for some of the best waves on Earth. The famed Margaret River region, on Wardandi Noongar Country in the South West, is home to more than 100 surf spots ranging from powerful reef breaks to fun beach surf. Other surfing hotspots include Exmouth, Gnaraloo, Quobba and Red Bluff along the Ningaloo Reef, and Esperance (Kepa Kurl), Kalbarri (Wurdimarlu) and Rottnest Island (Wadjemup). If you're into different types of boards, an easy 90-minute drive north of Perth takes you to the windsurfing mecca of Lancelin (Wangaree) – where you can also try out sandboarding on the white dunes.

WRECKS, REMOTE SHOALS AND TRAILS -DIVE AND SNORKEL

World Heritage-listed Ningaloo Reef, where you can wade out from the beach and be snorkelling over superb coral gardens teeming with colourful fish, manta rays and sea turtles, is one of the largest fringing reef systems in the world.

Navy Pier, at the Ningaloo gateway of Exmouth, is rated as one of the world's top 10 shore dives. North of Ningaloo Reef, the Mackerel Islands offer an island playground of secluded fringing reefs. In the Margaret River Region, you can explore Busselton letty through snorkel, dive, observatory or undersea walking tours. WA is also home to extraordinary shipwreck dives including HMAS Swan at Dunsborough, HMAS Perth in Albany (Kinjarling) and 19 wrecks around the Houtman Abrolhos Islands, off Geraldton (Jambinu), including the Batavia, which sunk in 1629 and led to one of the darkest chapters in WA history. In Perth, the Omeo shipwreck at Coogee has become 'insta famous'. If this isn't remote enough for you, take a tour to the 'aquarium in the middle of the ocean' at Rowley Shoals, 300 kilometres west of Broome, where it could just be you diving among coral gardens with giant clams and schools of tuna and mackerel. Follow the underwater snorkel trails at Little Salmon Bay on Rottnest Island or the Marmion Marine Park near Trigg in Perth where underwater plaques guide snorkellers and divers on an interactive journey to discover fish and marine species.



PHUTT LAGOON, CORAL COAST

PINK LAKES

WA's photogenic bubblegum pink lakes have to be seen to be believed. The most easily accessible is the dreamy Hutt Lagoon, near Port Gregory, traditional owners of the Yamatji people – located between the Coral Coast towns of Geraldton (Jambinu) and Kalbarri (Wurdimarlu). Best viewed between April and October, the waters could be red, bubble-gum pink or lilac depending on the conditions. On the south coast, the bright pink Lake Hillier on Middle Island near Esperance (Kepa Kurl) is sure to blow you away with its striking hues. Witness the awe-inspiring colours of both of these lakes from the air on a scenic flight, where the pink hues contrast with the blue of the ocean.

TIDAL PHENOMENON -STAIRCASES TO THE MOON AND WATERFALL REEFS

The Kimberley coast has some of the biggest tidal movements in the southern hemisphere, with the daily ebb and flow

of the tropical tides creating some of the region's most dreamlike attractions. From March to November, when conditions are just right, visitors to Broome (Rubibi) are treated to a breathtaking natural spectacle - the Staircase to the Moon. The phenomenon occurs around three times a month at extremely low tide when the full moon rises over the exposed mudflats of Roebuck Bay (Yawuru Nadulagun), creating the optical illusion of lunar stairs. The staircase phenomenon can also be experienced at other north-west locations including Karratha, Port Hedland and Onslow. Near Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm on the Dampier Peninsular north of Broome on Yawuru Country, tidal movements create the spectacular Waterfall Reef, where exposed reefs at low tide create a waterfall in the middle of the sea. On a Kimberley expedition cruise, witness a coral reef rising from the ocean in a torrent of cascading water during the tidal changes at Montgomery Reef, the world's largest inshore reef



HIKES & TRAILS

From steep and winding trails, to world-class multiday hikes and gentle hills, there's a trail experience to suit everyone. Here's our WA Dream List of the best hikes and trails in the State.



CAPE TO CAPE TRACK, MARGARET RIVER REGION

One of Australia's most iconic and varied trails, the Cape to Cape Track runs for 135 kilometres between the operational southwest lighthouses of Cape Naturaliste and Cape Leeuwin on Wardandi Country. Mostly following the coast, the track alternates between spectacular sweeping clifftop views with stretches of pristine beach and majestic karri forest. Allow five to eight days to tackle the whole walk, however, there are sections that make full day and half-day walks, and several tour operators that offer fully-quided walks. Tour operators such Cape to Cape Explorer Tours, Inspiration Outdoors and Walk into Luxury combine the best of the track with gourmet food and wine, and a range of accommodation.

BIBBULMUN TRACK, PERTH AND SOUTH WEST

One of the world's greatest long distance walks, the Bibbulmun Track spans 1,000 kilometres through some of Australia's most stunning scenery, including magnificent karri and tingle forests, rivers, valleys, ancient bushland and dramatic cliffs. From Kalamunda in the Perth Hills to Albany on the south coast, walkers can do the entire track, or shorter sections in a day or over a few days. Join Inspiration Outdoors for guided multi-day tours and The Hike Collective for track experiences as short as two hours.

MUNDA BIDDI TRAIL, PERTH AND SOUTH WEST

As the premier off-road cycling trail in Western Australia, the 1,000-kilometre trail meanders through scenic river valleys, towering eucalyptus forests and ancient, unspoiled bushland from Mundaring in the Perth Hills to Albany in the South West. Joined by a purpose-built track, the Munda Biddi (which means path through the forest in the Noongar language) has sections suitable for cyclists of all ages and experience levels. The trail is easily accessible by car, so you can begin your journey wherever it is convenient.

LOOP WALK, KALBARRI NATIONAL PARK

The challenging Loop Walk in Kalbarri National Park on Yamatji Country in WA's Coral Coast highlights the erosive power of the Murchison River and its magnificent red gorges; the iconic 'Nature's Window', a natural rock formation which frames the Murchison Valley; the Bigurda Trail boardwalk, where you can spot whales and dolphins; and the impressive new Kalbarri Skywalk, showcasing the Murchison River Gorge at one of its highest points.



MOUNT LENNARD, WELLINGTON NATIONAL PARK

The Mount Lennard Mountain Bike Trail Circuit contains approximately 40 kilometres of trails offering varying difficulties for mountain bikers of all levels. The trails tightly weave through the mature jarrah forest and granite outcrops to provide spectacular views of the lower Collie River Valley in the South West. The highlight is the 'Grizzly Trail' – a narrow trail with obstacles and technical mountain bike features for those who are up for the challenge.

WADJEMUP BIDI, ROTTNEST ISLAND

Traverse unique landscapes of Rottnest Island (Wadjemup) along Wadjemup Bidi - a series of walk trails in the A-class reserve, off the coast of Perth. Take on the whole 45-kilometre journey, or choose your own adventure, with five to 10-kilometre sections offering a new way to experience the island's stunning inland lakes, coastal headlands, Aboriginal art sculptures, WWII tunnels, snorkel spots and local wildlife, including the cute quokkas.

Heritage Cycle Trail, Swan Valley

Only a 25-minute drive from Perth, the scenic Swan Valley Heritage Cycle Trail is made up of three routes, suitable for riders of all ages and fitness levels. The trail passes many interesting places including fresh produce stalls, picnic spots, galleries, lively cafes, wineries, microbreweries, distilleries and restaurants. You will find many opportunities to stop, relax and enjoy an abundance of experiences.

LANE POOLE RESERVE, DWELLINGUP

Located in the Peel Region, just under 1.5 hours' drive from Perth, Lane Poole Reserve hosts the Murray Valley Mountain Bike Trails, catering for beginner, intermediate and advanced riders. The downhill trails can be accessed by the easy and moderate climbing trails, or via the shuttle road off Murray Valley Road. The trails offer stunning scenery and views over the valley, plus a diverse range of native flora and fauna.

THE KALAMUNDA TRAILS NETWORK, PERTH HILLS

About a 40-minute drive from Perth, the Kalamunda Trails area is the most popular mountain biking destination in Western Australia. With excellent facilities and more than 40 kilometres of fully signed single-track, the Kalamunda Trails have something for everyone. The two kilometre Scorpion decent is the most popular, known for its wooden berns and roller-coaster corners

PURNULULU NATIONAL PARK, THE KIMBERLEY

World Heritage-listed Purnululu National Park, in WA's Kimberley region, is home to the awe-inspiring Bungle Bungle Range. 350 million years in the making, its ochre and black striped domes make it one of the most unique and captivating ranges on Earth. The area's best day hikes include Cathedral Gorge and Echidna Chasm, while the five day Piccaninny Gorge Walk offers spectacular and secluded scenery.

ARKLOW TRAILS NETWORK, COLLIE

Completed in 2020, the Arklow Trails Network is located just five kilometres from the town of Collie in WA's South West. Designed for mountain bike enthusiasts, the trail network winds its way through the stunning Arklow forest, totalling 36-kilometres – of which 26-kilometres is new or upgraded trail. Six kilometres of the trail has been built to accommodate hand cycles, allowing mountain bike riders with disabilities the opportunity to enjoy even more of the area.

BLUFF KNOLL, STIRLING RANGE NATIONAL PARK

Located north of Albany in the Stirling Range National Park, Bluff Knoll is the highest and most spectacular peak in WA's South West, sitting at 1,098 metres above sea level. Requiring some fitness, the moderate five kilometre return hike is a picturesque three to four-hour journey to the panoramic views from the bluff, before the one descent to the base. The Stirling Range National Park is a biodiversity hotspot, home to 1,500 species of magnificent and colourful flora, many of which are unique to the area.

CASTLE ROCK, PORONGURUP NATIONAL PARK

The massive ancient granite domes of Porongurup National Park in WA's South West rise 670 metres above the landscape, surrounded by a sea of giant Karri trees. Home to the Castle Rock Granite Skywalk, a walking gantry mounted high out from the magnificent Castle Rock, the 4.4 kilometre return hike offers sweeping views of the stunning landscapes and surrounding plains near Albany.

KARIJINI GORGES AND TRAILS, KARIJINI NATIONAL PARK

Two billion years in the making, Karijini National Park in the Pilbara region is one of WA's most spectacular natural attractions offering amazing hiking trails through ancient gorges. An adventure lover's paradise, explore tunnels of marbled rock, clamber over boulders, squeeze through narrow tunnels, paddle through waterways and descend into ancient chasms – often featuring secret waterfalls. There's also easy access to stunning lookouts and walk trails for varying levels of fitness and experience. Some of the most popular trails include Dales Gorge, Fortescue Falls, Weano Gorge and Oxers Lookout.

CAPE RANGE NATIONAL PARK, NINGALOO

Located within the Ningaloo Coast World Heritage Area, Cape Range National Park's rugged limestone ranges and breathtaking deep canyons are surrounded by pristine beaches. Keep an eye out for the wildlife such as emus, kangaroos and a variety of birds on one of the many walk trails through the park, and wonder at the earthy tones of the arid landscapes. Join Exmouth Adventure Co for guided overnight walking tours of the gorges and coastline, including camping in the national park and snorkelling on Ningaloo Reef.


BOLD PARK, PERTH

At 85 metres above sea level, the sevenkilometre trail through Bold Park in City Beach offers spectacular views over the Indian Ocean, Perth city, Kings Park, and even glimpses of the Swan River. Join a guided hike group tour with The Hike Collective to meet other like-minded walkers, and visit during spring to spot a spectacular array of wildflowers


FITZGERALD RIVER NATIONAL PARK, GOLDEN OUTBACK

Bushwalking along one of the many trails in this botanical wonderland is the best way to explore the incredible variety of plant life and spectacular rugged landscapes of granite cliffs, limestone ridges, valleys, woodlands and pristine beaches. Fitzgerald River National Park boasts a rich diversity of native and rare plant species, and is one of Australia's largest parks – home to 75 species of endemic plants, found nowhere else in the world. Visit during wildflower season and join a tour with the likes of Edgewalkers to discover this rich biosphere of unique flora and fauna.





ABORIGINAL WESTERN AUSTRALIA



BRIAN LEE HUNTER'S CREEK TAGALONG TOURS (DAMPIER PENINSULA NORTH WEST)

The beautiful and remote Dampier Peninsula was once a camping ground for the Bardi (Saltwater) People of this region. Tag-along with Brian Lee to explore the history, seasonal bush fruit, traditional fishing techniques and stories of this timeless landscape, which is a wildlife haven for turtles, sea birds and whales.

GO CULTURAL TOURS & EXPERIENCES (PERTH)

The Perth-based company recently introduced two new cultural tours, in addition to its Elizabeth Quay Goomup experience. Visitors to Rottnest Island – known as Wadjemup to the local Nyoongar people - can now experience traditional Aboriginal culture on a new 90-minute walking tour. The tour offers visitors the opportunity to learn about Rottnest's history and the spiritual significance to the Nyoongar people, and includes a Welcome to Country, traditional sand ceremony, and song and storytelling with Aboriginal guide, Walter McGuire. In Perth's iconic Kings Park and Botanic Garden - known as Kaarta Koomba to the local Nyoongar people - guests can now learn about Kaarta Gar-up, the traditional name for the Mount Eliza escarpment in Kings Park, and its intriguing past and spiritual significance to the Aboriginal people on Kings Cultural's new Park Tour. gocultural.com.au

KOOMAL DREAMING (MARGARET RIVER, SOUTH WEST)

The Margaret River region's big drawcards – beaches, caves and dining – come together on tours led by local Wadandi man, Josh Whiteland. With Koomal Dreaming you'll journey into Ngilgi Cave for ancient stories and unique didgeridoo acoustics, and forage for, and taste, native food and medicine. The menu could include kangaroo, emu, quandong, emu plum and salt bush. **koomaldreaming.com.**

LURIDGII ECO CULTURAL TOURS (KUNUNURRA NORTH WEST)

Kununurra-based tour leader Ted Hall oversees four-wheel-drive tag-along tours, outback camping and cultural awareness programs in Miriuwung country. Tours include a Jaliwang Diamond Mine Tour through a rugged landscape steeped in traditions and Jaliwang (barramundi) Dreaming to reach the Argyle Diamond Mine, where you can see the precious gemstones – including the rare pink diamond – and the operations involved in their extraction. **Juridgiitours.com.au**



MIMBI CAVES (NEAR FITZROY CROSSING, KIMBERLEY - NORTH WEST).

One of Australia's best-kept secrets, this vast subterranean labyrinth is part of a 350-million-year-old Devonian reef system, which houses a significant collection of Aboriginal rock art and some of the most impressive fish fossils in the Southern Hemisphere. The Mimbi area is a place of strong spiritual significance for the traditional owners, the Gooniyandi people. Spectacular limestone formations, brilliant colours and crystal clear freshwater pools set the scene for a guided tour laced with Dreamtime stories and bush tucker. mimbicayes.com.au

NARLIJIA EXPERIENCES (BROOME, NORTH WEST)

Engaging tours by Broome born-and-bred Yawuru man Bart Pigram offer an Aboriginal and multicultural perspective of the pearling town and its fascinating history. You'll learn about saltwater people, the seasons, the land and the food that sustained this ancient coastal culture for thousands of years. Scour for oysters and other tasty morsels in Broome's mangroves, where you can spot mudskippers, mud crabs and a variety of birds at low tide. toursbroome.com.au

NGALANG WONGI ABORIGINAL CULTURAL TOURS (BUNBURY, SOUTH WEST)

Bunbury's original inhabitants, the Nyoongar people, hunted and fished throughout the Koombana Bay area for thousands of years. Artist and didgeridoo player Troy Bennell weaves his cultural knowledge into an array of Dreamtime stories and whimsical yarns about traditional and contemporary Aboriginal life, sacred sites, the Nyoongar six seasons and Dolphin Dreaming, linking to Koombana Bay's population of wild bottlenose dolphins. ngalangwongi.com.au

NGURRANGGA TOURS (BURRUP PENINSULA, PILBARA - NORTH WEST)

This unique archaeological area houses the world's largest collection of ancient Aboriginal rock carvings, with more than one million petroglyphs dating back as far as the last ice age. Tour this amazing outdoor art gallery and surrounding coastal landscape with Clinton Walker, a descendant of the local Ngarluma and Yindjibarndi people, who has spent his entire life learning about his ancestors and culture. **ngurrangga.**

MABU BURU TOURS (BROOME NORTH WEST)

Johani Mamid will take you on a very personal journey that explores Yawuru Culture through country, nature, history, lore and traditional knowledge. You'll discover things hidden in plain sight throughout the landscape of Cable Beach to Roebuck Bay, taste seasonal fruits, encounter local wildlife and hear the stories of the Yawuru. A special seasonal tour only operating in November and December, allows you to experience the turtle nesting season with your highly experienced guide. **broomeaboriginaltours.com.au**

OOLIN SUNDAY ISLAND CULTURAL TOURS (DAMPIER PENINSULA, NORTH WEST)

Join Roseanna Angus – a Jawi woman whose family lived on Sunday Island during the early mission days – to discover Bardi Jawi culture and the Dreaming stories connected to Sunday Island and the turbulent waters that separate it from the mainland. Departing from Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm, the tours retrace the ocean journey from Bardi Country on the mainland through the network of islands and tidal passages that make up Jawi Country, and through the whirlpools and eddies between Jooloom and Jayirru to learn how these massive tidal currents were used by the Jawi people to hunt, fish and trade. sundayislandtours.com.au

WARRANG-BRIDIL (PERTH)

This new walking tour reflects Warrang-Bridil's vision to 'close the gap' on knowledge and understanding of Nyoongar people's heritage, as they share their culture with visitors. The 60-minute 'on country' tour with a Nyoongar guide explores the shores of the spectacular Derbal Yerrigan (Swan River) overlooking Perth city, Matagarup Bridge and the Optus Stadium precinct. It also features in-depth insights into precolonisation of the Nyoongar nation and the importance of culture, language, values, relationships, responsibilities and social structures. warrang-bridil.com.au

GOLDFIELDS HONEY ANT TOURS (KALGOORLIE, GOLDEN OUTBACK)

Experience an authentic on-country bushfood foraging experience in the heart of WA's Golden Outback. You'll sample the sweetest of bushfoods, the prized honey ant, forage for witchetty grubs, discover seasonal nuts and fruits, and learn about bush medicine plants. After the foraging, gather round the campfire for billy tea, damper and slow cooked stew whilst being captivated by cultural stories about the traditional lifestyles of the Tjupan people and how they still practice cultural ways on country.

WULA GURA NYINDA ECO ADVENTURES (SHARK BAY WORLD HERITAGE REGION - CORAL COAST)







Located on the corner of Beaufort and Newcastle Street in the cultural hub of Northbridge, Ruinbar is a new 300-person venue that has taken over a previously dilapidated heritage building. The interiors are inspired by eastern European ruin bars, with the courtyard area currently plays host to alternating food trucks over weekends, with plans underway to open an Australian style pizzeria. With a third of the bar's 18 taps reserved for local WA beers and a steady rotation of Australian beers on the remaining taps, there is a beer-for-all - plus Aperol spritz and Paloma cocktails to suit all tastes.

SPIRIT OF LITTLE THINGS (SUBIACO, PERTH)

Spirit of Little Things is a new urban distillery that has opened its doors in Perth's city-fringing suburb of Subiaco. Producing small-batch artisan gin infused with native botanicals, the converted warehouse features a large copper still, high ceilings and polished concrete floors. A selection of local wines and craft beers feature alongside the many gin options, as well as a small food menu that showcases the best of WA's local produce. The venue also offers gin tasting flights and masterclasses.

TERRARIUM (PERTH)

Terrarium is an exciting new multi-level cocktail and spirits bar located in Perth's CBD (Boorloo). THE DAM (DENMARK, SOUTH WEST)

The Great Southern town of Denmark has recently welcomed the opening of The Dam restaurant, Located at the Raintree on a picturesque farming property, it is also home to a Cannabis Botanical Distillery - the first distillery in WA to use cannabis sativa to make its spirit base. The restaurant offers stunning views over the property's green hills and large dam, and serves a seasonal menu featuring local produce sourced from the property, alongside seltzers and cocktails made from the in-house distillery, plus local beers and wine. The Dam's garden also features an amphitheatre, where guests can enjoy drinks and antipasto platters in the sun whilst listening to live music.

THE BEAUFORT (MOUNT LAWLEY, PERTH)

The Beaufort is a new multi-level state-ofthe-art hospitality venue that has opened its doors along the vibrant Beaufort Street strip in Mount Lawley. Taking over a former 1950s warehouse space and set over three levels. The Beaufort offers patrons multiple different venues to explore. The ground floor features an outdoor beer and wine garden, which leads upstairs to the second level, the heart of the building and the main bar and dancefloor area which surrounds the central tiered jungle. Upstairs again is a large rooftop terrace space known as the Candy Bar, and hidden within the depths of the building is a concealed speakeasy called Cypher - which plays live music each night and has one of the largest spirit collections in Perth.
